

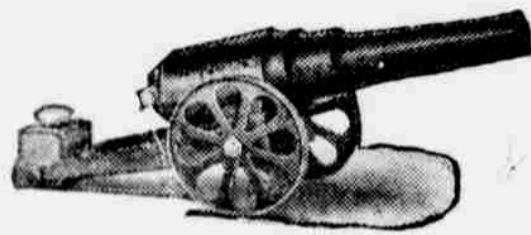


You Need Your Eyes

THREE DAYS WITH THE BUSINESS MEN OF HICKORY

To the Editor of the Record: It was my pleasure to make a three days' canvass among the business men of Hickory to secure 100 guarantors for a Chautauqua for next summer. I accompanied Miss Hershey, the representative of the Chautauqua Association of Pennsylvania, familiarly known as the Swarthmore Chautauqua. I have had some experience in matters of this kind, both in solicitation and the sensation of meeting defectors, but when the lady came to me and said it looked like it was going to be a failure unless someone should go with her, and did me the honor to ask me to go, upon reflection I agreed. We spent three days and a half, and visited probably seventy-five people. As about forty-eight had already signed the agreement, it was left to us to secure 55 more, for the contract called for 100, so that any deficit would fall lightly on each, and no one was to be responsible for any who failed, each guarantor to shoulder only his 100th part.

Well, we got off the names and unless war conditions are prohibitive of such things, we will have a Chautauqua next year. I wish to thank the business men of Hickory for their courteous treatment of the canvassers, and to congratulate the town on the splendid men of the city who have the faith, the vision, the usefulness, so provide for our people this quality of amusement by agreeing to the contract. I started out with hope, I finished with a steady assurance of the progressiveness of our people. We met with but one rebuff, and that was at once repented of. All were not convinced of the blessings of Chautauqua, but most kindly submitted to argument, ready to give and take. Others were enthusiastic, and one even volunteered for permission to sign. But Mr. Editor, aside from the matter in hand, I wish to acknowledge the privilege it was to meet business men on their own grounds, see them in their daily environment, behold their attack on life's daily battle field, and find out faith growing in their invincibility. It was an education to a preacher, and I immensely enjoyed the experience. I also take pleasure in saying that the pastor of the larger churches signed the contract except one who will not be here at the time. Also a number of ladies signed. J. G. GARTH.
