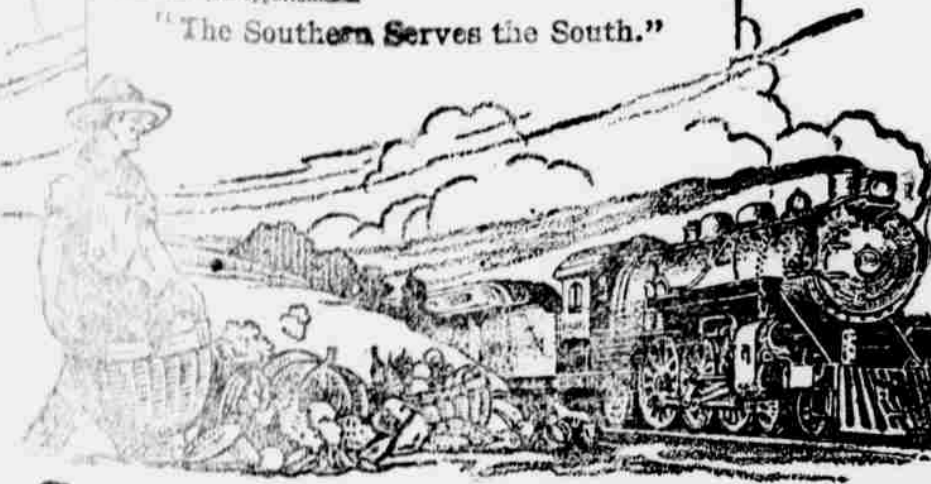

NAVY LEAGUE WOMEN TO KNIT FOR SOLDIERS

Washington, Sept. 27.—Navy league women, barred by Secretary Daniels' decision from knitting woolen comforts for sailors, will knit the garments for soldiers and the army has accepted them.

Mrs. James Carroll Frazer, chairman of the comforts committee of the Navy league made public a letter from Secretary Baker of the war department, accepting the offer of the Navy league women to knit for the troops in the trenches.

Hundreds of thousands of women who had been knitting for the sailors when the controversy between Secretary Daniels and the Navy league interrupted the work will now go on but the product will be sent to the army.

DANES REDUCE AGAIN THEIR STANDING ARMY

Copenhagen, Sept. 27.—The Dutch government has ordered another reduction in the size of the standing army. The step is taken, it is stated, "mainly for financial reasons, but also because discipline in the army has been weakened and its quality deteriorated under protracted service."

At the beginning of the European war, Denmark called up 45,000 men in addition to the 2,500 who are always under training. This force was gradually reduced to 25,000, and a further reduction of about 25 percent has now been decided upon.

All the parties, except the Conservative group, have approved of the government's decision. The Conservatives declined acquiescence on the ground that they could not admit that "the danger of a violation of neutrality was diminished."

LARGE GERMAN SEAPLANES BROUGHT INTO FLUSHING

London, Sept. 27.—Two large German seaplanes have been brought into Flushing, Holland, by Dutch torpedo boats, and it is reported that they participated in the air raid on England, says a dispatch to the Evening News from Rotterdam. One of the four German airmen was seriously wounded. The three others have been interned.

NOTICE OF RIGHT TO DEMAND THE SUBMISSION OF WATER BOND ORDINANCE TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF HICKORY.

Whereas on the 14th day of August, 1917, the City Council of Hickory passed an ordinance authorizing the issuance of the City of Hickory's Bonds in an amount not in excess of seven thousand dollars for the purpose of extending the water works system.

And whereas said ordinance contained a paragraph in literal compliance with Section 17 (1) (3) III of "The Municipal Finance Act of 1917," providing that said ordinance should not be submitted to the voters of the city, unless within thirty days after its first publication a petition for its submission was filed under said Municipal Finance Act.

And whereas said portion of said section is inconsistent with other parts of "The Municipal Finance Act of 1917," other parts containing provisions for submission to the voters upon filing a petition within thirty days after the last publication of said ordinance:

And whereas the City Council desires to comply with the spirit as well as with the letter of the law:

Now, therefore, notice is hereby given that the said Water Bond Ordinance will be submitted to the voters for their approval or disapproval, if a petition is filed within thirty days after the last publication of said ordinance; and that the city will not issue or attempt to issue any Water Bonds until thirty days after the last publication of said ordinance has passed without a petition having been filed or if one is so filed will not issue or attempt to issue such bonds, unless the ordinance shall be approved by the voters of the city. The voters have until the 10th day of October, 1917, to file a petition for referendum.

LENOIR COUNTY PUTS ON LIFE EXTENSION WORK

Lenoir is the next county in the state to include life extension in its program of health work for the fall and winter. Dr. J. S. Mitchell, Lenoir's active whole time health officer, will do the work but will be assisted by Dr. A. J. Ellington, who is director of life extension work for the state board of health. Work will start in Lenoir about October 8.

This health movement will consist of a thorough medical examination which will be made free for any person in the county between the age of 20 and 65 years. Its purpose is to prolong human life and to do it when life is most valuable to the individual.

When any oncoming disease or injuries are discovered through the examination, the patient is advised what treatment to seek or what course to follow in his daily habits to prevent or offset the approaching illness. No operations are made and no treatment given. In addition to the physician's advice, the patients are given the instruction they need in free health pamphlets, which treat fully the most common degenerative diseases.

The first week of the campaign will be given to organizing and explaining the work to the people. Dr. Mitchell will have a well equipped office in Kinston for making the examinations as well as any laboratory tests that may be needed. Lenoir's life extension work will be similar to that done in Vance and Alamance counties by Dr. Ellington this spring.

KULTUR AGAIN PROBED

After other revelations of German diplomatic methods, probably no great stir will be made by the disclosure of the atrocious plot at Bucharest, which included the dissemination of anthrax germs. The plot was foiled by a timely search, and it may be said that one foiled plot more or less does not greatly matter. Nor will the discover of explosives in the German embassy at Bucharest cause much anger as the detection of German officials smuggling bombs into Norway to blow up Norwegian shipping.

But while the plot exposed in the report made to the state department by the secretary of the legation at Bucharest does not give a climax to the series, it is all of a piece with the rest, and gives cumulative force. This country's special concern because its good offices were as shamefully abused in Rumania as those of Sweden in Argentina. There is said to be direct testimony that the explosives and the poison were brought to the legation after the protection of German interests had been taken over by the United States. If it were not for the bad record of German diplomats elsewhere it would be difficult to believe that there was official knowledge of the plot; after the disclosures in Washington, in Christiania, in Buenos Aires, and other capitals the worst interpretation will inevitably be everywhere assumed to be the true one.

This is one more painful lesson that Germany, while under its present sinister government, cannot be trusted either by foe or by friend. The nation that does it a favor is in danger of being secretly used for dirty work, and the lives of neutrals are plotted against with as cold-blooded a malignity as though they were Germany's worst enemies. This is sheer diabolism, and till it is exercised it is impossible for civilization to have dealings with the imperial government. The kaiser favors a boycott of offending nations; well, no country has ever given the world more reason for a boycott than the country which he has misruled and misled.
