### DESERVES PLACE IN HISTORY

**William Billings of Boston Heads the List of American Composers of Music.**

America's first composer of any note was William Billings, who was born in Boston, October 7, 1746. In his youth he was a tanner, but a love for music led him to become a teacher of singing and a composer of psalm tunes, which eventually found their way into every church choir of New England and became great favorites with the people.

He published no fewer than six collections of tunes, all founded upon the new school of religious music then coming in vogue in England. Their contrast to the dismal old tunes previously in use naturally gave them an immense popularity; and, in fact, they effected a musical revolution in all the English colonies of America. They were far from being perfect in melody and harmony and would be considered very crude today, but the composer displayed an originality approaching genius, and had he enjoyed the educational advantages open to composer of today his compositions would doubtless have possessed a permanent value.
