BUY LIBERTY BONDS

Hickory's campaign to raise about \$150,000 for the Liberty loan was begun Tuesday night at a well attended meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and the nucleus of an organization was effected that will carry the bond news to the citizens of the town and the country tributary to it. On motion, President Elliott was instructed to appoint a chairman of the campaign committee with authority to call on every member of the chamber and other citizens to aid in the campaign and Secretary Joy was named for the place. President Elliott will be absent from the city for about 10 days, but he will pull off his coat on his return. Every man at the meeting, including Casiers Menzies and Orebaugh pledged their hearty support.

It was freely predicted that the present issue would go better than the last. The bonds will pay four per cent interest and will not be taxed except for excess on incomes; the average business man and farmer, earning less than \$5,000, will pay no taxes on these bonds, and they will be a good investment.

In a few years, it was said, the bonds would sell above par and can be sold at any time. One can borrow on them as if they were currency, and that is what they are practically.

This section of the state did its full duty by the first issue of Liberty bonds, and it is confidently believed that every man, woman and child who possibly can do so, will subscribe for one or more of the new bonds. Interest will be paid semi-annually and the bonds are as good as the government.

Let's do our full duty by the government and ourselves in this great cause.

NEW YORK ELECTION

The "loyal party man" who accepts the verdict at the polls in the primary may not like the idea of Mayor Mitchell's candidacy for reelection as an independent, but men who think more of honest government than of party regularity will wish the mayor success in his fight against the two boss-ridden political machines. That Tammany always is ready to walk off not only with the emoluments but with the perquisites in various forms of any office is well known and the Republican organization in New York city is not like Tammany for the reason that it hasn't had Tammany's opportunities.

The Republican machine is under fire of the district attorney of New York for alleged frauds practiced in the primary that nominated Bennett over Mitchell, and it is possible that the grand jury will be set to work to catch a number of thieves.

In the meantime Mayor Mitchell, whose administration is endorsed by the foremost citizens of New York and elsewhere, will make the race as an independent candidate and persons who want to see the chief city of the world well governed will wish for his success.

The Hickory Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night went on record as favoring the impeachment of Senator LaFollette for his almost treasonable utterances since the country has been at war, and Senator Simmons and Overman will be asked to press the matter. LaFollette has had many friends in this state, but his recent activities have estranged those persons who think more of their country than they do of a man who persists in misstating facts and lending aid and comfort to the enemy. The action of the directors was by rising vote.

The first issue of Liberty bonds, bearing a rate of 3 1-2 per cent can be converted into four per cent issues. The printing of these bonds was a huge task and the certificates are expected here in two weeks. In the meantime you might subscribe for the new issue, and help in a good cause.

OF GREAT IMPORTANCE

The desperate nature of the attack of the Germans on the positions won recently from them in Flanders by the British show the real importance of the lost ground. If General Haig succeeds in taking the dominating ridges, he will be able to fight with all the advantages of observation posts at his back, whereas the Germans will be in the low country, where the water is one foot under the surface of the earth. The Germans could not hold northern Belgium if Haig goes much farther, and for this reason it is to be hoped that good weather will prevail for at least six more weeks, so as to give the British opportunity to clinch their victories before the cold rains set in. The German report yesterday declared the British had been ousted from a section of the captured positions, but the official report from London today will show in all probability that it has been retaken.

Persons who attended the Caldwell Fair today were given a treat. Judge Pritchard delivered the opening address and this grand old man told them something of their duty in the war, not that Caldwell citizens need to be reminded of it. A few men like Judge Pritchard, although they are unable to bear arms, are worth a division to their country, and it is a source of pride that they are doing all in their power to help in the great cause for which the nation is fighting.

The mayorality campaign in New York will be something more than a fight against two bad political machines. In addition it will be a contest between Americanism and those influences which will make a trade with one of the corrupt organizations for delivering votes in payment for action that would hinder the United States. If the issue is presented clearly, Mitchell should win, even in New York.

Hickory people are asked to buy Liberty bonds, this time at 4 per cent. The last bonds, which sold at 3 1-2 per cent, are quoted above par on the stock exchange, and in a few years the present issue will be worth about \$110. It will be good business as well as good patriotism to purchase one or more.

N. C. APPORTIONMENT IS TWENTY-SEVEN MILLIONS

Richmond, Va., Oct. 3.—Apportionment of Liberty loan bonds to each state embraced in the fifth regional district was completed last night by Governor George J. Seay, of the federal reserve bank of Richmond and letters announcing the amounts banking centers throughout the district would be expected to subscribe to the second issue of the loan were mailed out to banks, trust companies and other subscription agencies. Secretary McAdoo has allotted to this district four per cent of the entire \$3,000,000,000 issue. The various states in the district will be expected to subscribe, in order to secure the amount "imperatively demanded" as announced by Mr. McAdoo as follows:

District of Columbia	\$20,000,000
Maryland	\$65,000,000
North Carolina	\$27,000,000
South Carolina	\$20,000,000
Virginia	\$45,000,000
West Virginia	\$23,000,000
Total	\$200,000,000

The apportionment for this district, of four per cent of the total is \$120,000,000 but Governor Seay expects the full \$200,000,000 to be raised and on this basis has made his allotments.

NOTICE OF RIGHT TO DEMAND THE SUBMISSION OF WATER BOND ORDINANCE TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF HICKORY.

Whereas on the 14th day of August, 1917, the City Council of Hickory passed an ordinance authorizing the issuance of the City of Hickory's Bonds in an amount not in excess of seven thousand dollars for the purpose of extending the water works system.

And whereas said ordinance contained a paragraph in literal compliance with Section 17 (1) (j) III of "The Municipal Finance Act of 1917," providing that said ordinance should not be submitted to the voters of the city, unless within thirty days after its first publication a petition for its submission was filed under said Municipal Finance Act.

And whereas said portion of said section is inconsistent with other parts of "The Municipal Finance Act of 1917," other parts containing provisions for submission to the voters upon filing a petition within thirty days after the last publication of said ordinance.

And whereas the City Council desires to comply with the spirit as well as with the letter of the law:

Now, therefore, notice is hereby given that the said Water Bond Ordinance will be submitted to the voters for their approval or disapproval, if a petition is filed within thirty days after the last publication of said ordinance; and that the city will not issue or attempt to issue any Water Bonds until thirty days after the last publication of said ordinance has passed without a petition having been filed or if one is so filed will not issue or attempt to issue such bonds, unless the ordinance shall be approved by the voters of the city. The voters have until the 10th day of October, 1917, to file a petition for referendum.
