D. A. R. TO BUY BONDS AND RESTORE FRENCH VILLAGE

Springfield, Mass., Oct. 25--Plans of the national D. A. R. to restore the French village of Tilloy and raise \$100,000 to buy liberty bonds by contributions of \$1 each from all members of the body were outlined at the state and annual conference here by Mrs. George Hatcher Guernsey president general. Mrs. Frank D. Ellison, state regent, in responding, said the chapters of the state would do their part in both parts.

\$15,000 Water Extension Bonds, maturing \$500, annually October 1, 1918 to 1947.
\$33,000 Funding bonds maturing \$3,000 annually October 1, 1918 to 1924 and \$4,000 annually October 1, 1925 to 1927.
\$70,000 Street Bonds for property owners' share, maturing \$5,000 annually October 1, 1918 and 1919 and \$6,000 annually October 1, 1920 to 1929.
\$35,000 Street Bonds for the City's share, maturing \$1,500 annually October 1, 1918 to 1927, and \$2,000 annually October 1, 1928 to 1937.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check of two per cent of the par value of bonds bid for, drawn to the order of the City Treasurer upon an incorporated bank or trust company or must be accompanied by cash in like amount, to secure city against any loss resulting from failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid. Bids must be unconditional except as to legality of bonds and the bidder must agree to accept delivery of the bonds not later than Nov. 27th, 1917 and then make full payment therefor.

Washington, Oct. 25--Provost Marshal General Crowder has received a telegraphic report from Governor Pinkman from Hawaii saying that the island would fill its quota in the national army. The total registration, the report states, is 26,388 of which only 8,936 are citizens or declarants. Hawaii already has furnished by volunteering more than twice her gross quota, but the government states that patriotic sentiment is increasing in the island.

A visit to the Red Cross sewing room in the postoffice building yesterday afternoon showed the Record man what the good ladies are doing against the time when the materials they are making will be needed by American soldiers in France. There were only four ladies present, but they were making four of the seven machines hum and pajamas were being turned out rapidly. Some times more than four are present, but not often.

Mrs. Council told of a good lady with a large family who takes the work home and returns it after completing it. Incidentally she does her own housework, and makes as many garments as any other helper. She is more than doing her part, and is a heroine.

The sewing quarters are comfortable and there are seven machines. It is suggested that at least seven or eight persons can work each afternoon and by dividing up the work among a score or more, the burden will fall easily on the ladies. And the work must be done.
