Mental Disease Prevalent in Russia After the Revolution Is Termed "Mass Psychosis."

The Russian revolution has produced a mental disease which is characterized by Prof. P. J. Rosenbach, presi-6,000 and 7,000 insane soldiers, but that in no case did he discover that

sudden and drastic changes in Russian political, social and intellectual life. One of the symptoms of "mass psychosis," he says, is "infatuation with committees, delegations and demonstrations." Similar phenomena were observed during the French revolution after the war of 1870-71, Professor Rosenbach observes.

Russia's Platinum Production. The production of platinum in the Ural district in Russia in 1916 is estimated by a correspondent of the London Mining Journal at only 78,674 1915; 156,774 ounces in 1914, 173,642 ounces in 1913 and 175,381 ounces in 1912. The decrease last year extended to nearly all the districts, but was most marked on the Demidov estates and the Shuvalov placers. The shortage of labor has been one of the causes of the decrease.
