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PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING (By Dr. J. R. Campbell) As there seems to be some difference of opinion as to what this public health nursing ought to be, I wish to give a short explanation of my view of the origin, and scope of the work.

When the government called out the men under the draft act, for enrollment in the U. S. Army, in the world war, and the reports began to come in, the officers were dismayed by the number of young men rejected for physical defects.

It was found that Germany had a large percentage of children, who had contracted a large part of the diseases of infancy, before they were three years of age.

The nurse was to inspect all children while in school, hunt out the defects, and try to have them removed. To teach the children how to keep themselves fit, as they grow up, to correct old superstitions in every way to increase their efficiency.
