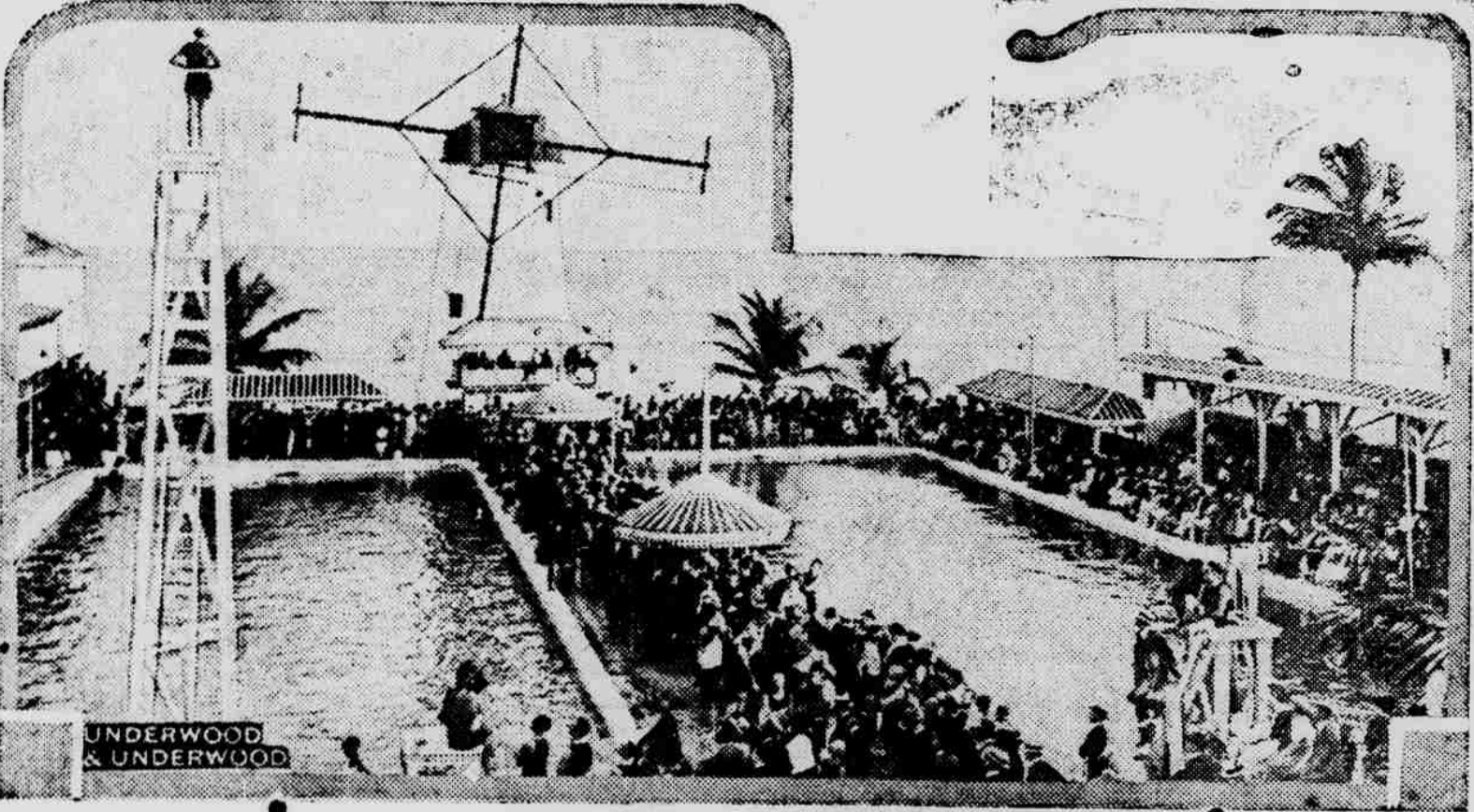
DO NOT INSIST ON CHANGING MEASURE
