MR. STANFORD GIVES LECTURE

Scenes depicting the life and customs in the Holy land and many views of places where Christ taught and labored during his life on earth were shown in stereopticon slides at the First Methodist church last night when Rev. A. L. Stanford, pastor of Main street Methodist church of Gastonia, and for four years pastor of the First Methodist church of Hickory, gave a graphic account of his trip to the Holy land last year.

Mr. Stanford has many warm friends who welcomed him home again last night and before the time for the lecture to start the main auditorium of the church was filled and the crowd overflowed into the Sunday school room which was thrown open. Mr. Stanford expressed his pleasure at being back in the midst of his Hickory friends and it was a treat for his friends to hear him once more.

The speaker told of his dreams for many years of journeying to the Holy land and related how his dreams were materialized last year when it was found that he could get a three month's absence from his work.

The ship on which he sailed left the New York harbor on June 30th last year and beginning with a picture of the ship, Mr. Stanford carried his audience with him from the time he landed at Bierut City until he called for home on the "Rochambeau". The speaker stated at the outset that the scenes which he was showing last night were the most interesting ones visited on his trip and his talk as he illustrated the pictures was laden with interest and carried a moral that was apt while now and then he punctuated his talk with witty remarks. It was a rare treat indeed to go into Egypt, to visit the pyramids in the desert, to see Jerusalem and Bethlehem and Nazareth to wander by the dead sea and to see the Mt. of Olives. A number of other interesting scenes were traditional while others were authentic. In the garden of Gethsemane was shown the tree under which Christ argued that if it were possible, the cup be passed from him and in another scene was shown the traditional workshop in which Christ labored as a carpenter for many years.

Old testament places which are known to us through sacred and profane history, places where Christ labored and taught, the customs and people of that time and today, and pictures of the old world as it is now were brought before the eyes of the audience very clearly. The slides were flashed upon the screen by Mr. Marcus Kennedy.

In closing his lecture which lasted for nearly two hours, Mr. Stanford showed pictures of his party and one of a very pretty young girl of Jerusalem, fourteen years of age whom he is sending through school to become a missionary among her own people.

Mr. Stanford is financing her education. Although he is willing for anyone who is interested to have a part in the education of this young lady. Special music was a feature of the lecture last night and at its close Mr. Stanford spent some time in greeting his old friends and acquaintances.
