PRIZES AWARDED AT BROOKFORD TODAY

Prizes for best kept yards and prettiest flower plots in the Brookford mill village were awarded by a committee this morning after an inspection tour that included more than 50 homes and that put the judges to thinking as to who were the prize-winners. There was no great difficulty in determining the four prettiest premises, but so many of the yards were well cared for that the committee had some studying to do. In each instance, however, the decision of the committee was unanimous.

Mr. J. P. Duval, assistant treasurer of the company, chose the committee yesterday and when they appeared, he and Sgt. H. F. Moody sent Mr. J. J. Stepp, master mechanic, around with it and the judges had only numbers to go by. The names of the winners were not known to the committee until after the report had been made. This was done in order to give all the contestants an absolutely impartial deal.

Under the management of Superintendent Moodey, Mr. Duval and Mr. Stepp, wonderful improvements have been made about the grounds of the mills. Flowers and grass plots have replaced barns and coal bins and the neatness and beauty of the mill property was reflected in many well kept yards. No flower gardens in Hickory could surpass some of those seen this morning. Certainly no yards were cleaner than some visited.

On the recommendation of the judges, Messrs. Moody and Duval added a fourth prize. The first prize, awarded to Mrs. L. M. Hefner, calls for \$25 cash; the second, given to Mrs. J. Kelley Butler, \$15; the third, Mrs. Sid Lewis, \$10; and the fourth, Mrs. C. Smith, \$5. Mrs. Lewis and Mrs. Smith were close contestants.

The judges gave honorable mention to Mrs. Jim Newton, Mrs. J. W. Price, Mrs. Etta Rich, Mrs. O. E. Winebarger, Mrs. Reinhardt, Mrs. Fannie Couch, Mrs. W. P. Pope and Mrs. Jim Foster and might properly have included some others.

It was a pleasure to see the improvements made about this mill, which is making some of the finest cotton goods in the country. The people are interested in their work and are glad to cooperate heartily in improvements. Mr. Stepp is the landscape gardener, the tree surgeon, building inspector and all round man and shows much interest in his job. The company is to be congratulated.

The judges were Mrs. Carrie Gable, Mrs. Edward Clement, Edgar L. Fox and S. H. Farabee. Incidentally the judges were presented with some pretty cloth.
