Mrs. Sharp is a brilliant woman, an excellent speaker and is well known here, having spoken in Hickory several years ago while a candidate for a public office. Mr. Shuford introduced her as a woman who has made her own place in the Republican party in North Carolina.

The first of Mrs. Settle's speech was devoted mainly to the women's place in politics and she urged the men to bring the women out to the public speakings, now that they have a hand in

Politics is a fine thing, asserted Mrs.
