TUESDAY'S ELECTION.

The Gold Standard Gets A Black Eye.

Fourteen States voted Tuesday, and while the result in some States is unknown, yet enough is known to warrant us in saying that it was a big victory for Silver. Parker, an avowed Silver man, carries New York State by 46,000 majority. Tammany sweeps the city of greater New York. Tracy the regular Republican candidate for Mayor ran 175,000 votes behind the McKinley vote of last year. Pennsylvania and Massachusetts are Republican as usual but by reduced majorities.

It looks like Mark Hanna, the Matt Ransom of Ohio, was defeated.

The Republicans carry Iowa, South Dakota and probably Maryland though by reduced majorities. The Democrats carry New York, Kentucky, Virginia and probably Ohio. The Populist-Silver fusion carries Nebraska and Kansas. The Populists carry Colorado. The effect of this election will be to place Tammany at the head and sole dictator of the Democratic party, and a goldbug of the Croker or Dave Hill kind will be put up for President by that party in 1900. Mark Hanna's prediction.

LATEST.—Ohio goes Republican by 26,520, and Mark Hanna has 51 majority in the Legislature.
