That 70 odd Democratic increase at the Lincoln box was worthy of note in an off year.

The election proved what? That depends on your viewpoint.

Democratic Chairman Love is all smiles. Is a Democratic majority for the Democratic candidate, with considerable increase over last election in Lincoln county.

Congratulations to Congressman Clyde R. Hoey, who on last Tuesday was elected by the Democrats to succeed Judge Webb. Lincoln county Democrats are due congratulations for the increased Democratic majority given their candidate in Lincoln. The percentage of increase in majority was up around the top.

For an off year in elections the voters turned out remarkably well over the ninth last Tuesday, and Mr. Hoey's majority is a very safe one, considering the fact that many had failed to pay poll tax, and too the opposition put up a very active fight.

A Cherryville man called up Lincoln three times election night to learn the Hoey majority in the ninth. It was not big enough to suit him and he said something that sounded like what Lieut. Gov. Gardner said to the negro said. But when told of the increased Democratic majority in Lincoln the Cherryville man said, "good night, bully for Lincoln."

The majority in the district was not as large for Mr. Hoey as you would like to have seen, but then, this is an off year, and a special election with the voters unarmed in many cases, with a poll tax receipt, prevents many from putting one over.

Just to be plain about it, the Republicans thought they saw a good opportunity to send a Congressman from the Ninth and they did their dead level best to get out their full strength, and they got out a good vote. The Democrats got out their vote in some counties, but in others there was a stay at home of Democrats, and Mr. Hoey got a majority, and that is more than enough. There are many Democrats who will be there next time who were sleeping late last Tuesday.

Considering that Mecklenburg has gone through a strike period, recall election, etc., and has other troubles common to all communities in reconstruction, the Democracy of that county did exceedingly well last Tuesday. The Democratic vote in that county totaled 3,675, while last fall the total Democratic vote in that county was 3,969. That was fine and dandy for Democracy. Go ahead and enjoy your Democracy.

REAPING WHAT WE HAVE SOWN
Two interesting incidents which have just occurred as the results of Senator Lodge's determination to fight the President are the refusal of Germany to sign the protocol fixing its liability for the ships sunk at Scapa Flow, and the letter of thanks from China to the Senate for its heroic efforts over Shantung. These are but the beginning. We shall get plenty more results from Mr. Lodge's famous victory. Germany has been watching the Senate with the keenest interest and the warmest appreciation of Mr. Lodge's efforts. The President fought Germany and the Senator fights the President. Therefore bonds of common interest unite Nahant and Berlin. Without striking a blow, the Germans did what was never done before in the world—they raised steam and went to sea to deliver their war vessels to the Allied fleet. And then they got up spirit enough to do a perfidious act to scuttle the vessels which they had supinely given to the enemy.

For that, of course, they ought to pay roundly, and they would not have thought of disputing the bill had not the Senate defeated the peace treaty. On the strength of this discussion among its enemies Germany plucks up courage to refuse to render the indemnity. In refusing to recognize the status quo in Tsing Tau the Senate has affronted the one Asiatic nation with which it is important to us to be on friendly terms. Far the most progressive nation in Asia, Japan is the only one with an important merchant marine and is our only rival in the control of the Pacific Ocean. It is of very great importance to us to maintain friendly relations with Japan. Senator Lodge has used language about Japan such as no Senator ever before used of a nation with which we were at peace, and the fact that he is the chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs makes his words and actions all the more significant.

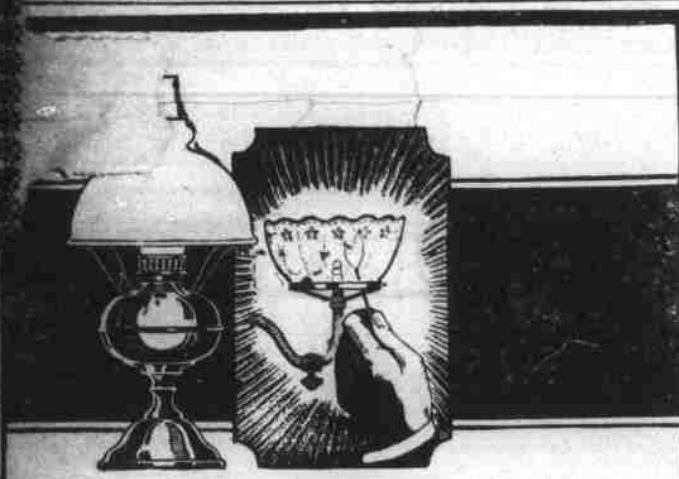
