The foundation stones of any good town—Churches and school. Register and vote "For School Bonds." Registration books close next Saturday at 12.

When the vote is taken you will know how Lincoln stands on "For School Bonds". Are you going to put your vote in the box. Then register, and be ready.

Some say "they" ought to do this and that. Who is this "they"? If you are for the school bonds don't wait on "they" but register yourself and vote. Registration books close next Saturday at 12 noon.

Lincolnton school trustees have studied and planned for you. They know the school needs of the city. Surely you can't afford to oppose school improvements in keeping with growing Lincoln. The registration books close next Saturday at 12 noon.

We believe the voters of Lincoln are going to carry the "For School Bonds" election if the entire citizenship becomes aroused to their duty in the matter and register and vote. Indifference on the part of the friends of the issue appears to be the only thing in the way of success. Registration books close next Saturday at 12 noon.

The school bonds to be voted on next week are for present and future school needs. The present generation pays its share and the next generation will get the same benefit if you voters of Lincoln do so well. It is a matter of will you do it. Each benefits and each generation pays. That's fair.

Mr. and Mrs. Voter, after all it is said you decide the school bond question. The responsibility is all on the voters of Lincoln. All of the preliminaries have been attended to by your servants, and they ask your approval. Register and be prepared to render your decision. Whatever you do render. Then your officials will understand what you want.

"For School Bonds?" then register yourself, then register your family connection who can qualify, then ask your friends next door, or down the street to register and vote for school bonds, work this week for the children of Lincoln. They are worth it. You want your schools to keep pace with the progress of this or any other town. Books close next Saturday at 12 noon.

"They" may not attend to it. Register and vote for school bonds. Registration books close next Saturday 12 noon. Don't put it off.

Did you ever see a town with too many school rooms—a growing town we mean—like Lincoln. There is a new crop of babies here every year, and when they get about 5 years old they begin to talk about going to school next year. Lincoln is growing in population and wealth. New people have moved here because school advantages were good. Having outgrown its schools, the only way to get more to it vote for school bonds. Have you registered? The issue is up now. There is no telling what will be up next year. Grasp the present opportunity.

Always vote "For School Bonds" and there will always be plenty of room for the children to go to school. Of course it costs money and more taxes, but the children can't be educated unless the parents are willing to foot the bill. The question is are they willing. They can afford it if they so will. What do you will. Who is it that does not desire their children to have the best educational advantages obtainable. There is only one way. Vote and work for it. Our system is education by taxation. If you want better schools here vote for school bonds.

Are you for education of the masses. Do you believe saint and sinner, rich and poor should receive public school advantages alike. There is only one way to get it. Vote for school bonds whenever and wherever the opportunity arises. You may never have another opportunity if you fail to do your duty now by registering and voting for \$200,000 for Lincoln schools. It is everybody's duty as a citizen to back up the schools. Don't allow anything to sway you from your duty to the children. It is good business to favor schools progress. The schools come first. Lincoln has the churches.

If this government of free America is ever undermined, ignorance and sin will be the cause. Vote for school bonds. See that children are educated well.

One thing the people of Lincoln can't be united on—they like the schools they have had since they built

their first brick school house here so well that they now want larger ones and more of them to take care of the growing needs of growing Lincoln. \$200,000 is just about right, a large number of them will tell you, to keep the city schools where they belong, a bit ahead of present needs. Lincoln is growing so fast, and new people coming in so fast to go to school that the extra tax will ruin no one.

Can't dodge the issue: "Am I my brother's keeper." You are. What is good for the masses is good for all. Educate the masses—educate them well and all problems of government will be settled intelligently and right. Register and vote "For School Bonds." In the next generation "his mark" will be a curiosity. Your opportunity has arrived, are you going to do your duty or are you asleep.

"Too much money" is the best argument we have heard against school bonds. But was there ever too much money invested in fire proof school buildings. It is not too much for a growing town. If \$200,000 is spent here for school buildings it will be the very cause of the town growing even faster. Think seriously about this before deciding to oppose school progress. Let us not discourage the friends of public schools, but rather encourage them. We would appeal to our people to weigh the matter carefully. It will be discouraging for the friends of education to allow "For School Bonds" to fail.

Towns the size of Lincoln are spending more than \$200,000 for new school buildings. Outside, a mere village in comparison, has a quarter of million dollar fire proof school building. Smithfield proposes to spend \$200,000 for a high school building alone and \$100,000 more for other school buildings. Cherryville, our neighbor spent \$80,000 repairing a school building. It takes money, big money, but build fire proof school buildings. Lincoln will grow and the proposed bond issue will not be too much if the towns grows, and it surely will grow; its growing every day. Think seriously and vote for the best for the children of your town. You will think well of your action in less than five years—Lincoln County News.
