Way down in his heart we suspect that President Harding wishes George Harvey had never been converted to Republicanism.

Henry Ford's offer to take over the Muscle Shoals nitrate plant and the uncompleted Wilson dam on a basis of \$5,000,000 cash payment and \$1,500,000 yearly installments on a 100-year lease recalls the partisan stupidity of Congress in blocking a great government enterprise which promised to yield big financial returns besides being an insurance against nitrate shortage in the event of a future war. Henry Ford is a canny business man and he would not make the offer he has made if he were not convinced of the tremendous business and financial prospects in sight. But because the nitrate plant and the Wilson dam were commenced in the Wilson administration, and because the fertilizer trust was opposed to their continuance or completion, Congress last year struck out the \$10,000,000 item in theundry civil appropriation bill to continue the work this year. Government engineers had testified that the government could easily realize a handsome profit on its investment, and it was well known that the nitrate plant would be a great factor in setting agriculture free from the grip of fertilizer trust, but Congress said nay. Now Ford, after having a corps of engineers investigating the properties for months shows that Congress was just as stupid as it was bitterly partisan in its action last year, and that the interests of the government as well as the people would have been best served by leaving politics out of consideration and acting as broad-minded statesmen.

TEXTILE DEPARTMENT, NORTH CAROLINA STATE COLLEGE, RALEIGH, N. C.

This department which is the North Carolina Textile School has made a good record during the past year. More students have been registered for textile courses than in any other textile school in the South. The equipment is the best that can be obtained and covers all branches of Cotton Manufacturing from cotton in the bale to the finished product. This includes not only the designing of fancy shirt waistings, dress goods, table covers, towels, etc., but bleaching and dyeing yarns for these fabrics.  
That the equipment of this school is up to date and the instruction is of recognized standard is evidenced by the fact the Students Medal was again awarded the school by the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers. Two of the requirements to obtain this medal are that there must be a good equipment and the instruction must be of recognized standard.  
The National Association of Cotton Manufacturers is the largest association of its kind in America and embraces among its members cotton

manufacturers from all over America. There is a large demand for the graduates of this Textile School, many of whom are filling responsible positions in the mill and allied industries.

**2 KILLED IN FURIOUS BATTLE**

Anderson, S. C., July 16.—Two men are dead and four men were committed to the county jail this afternoon following a shooting affray in the Carswell Institute community, 16 miles below here, yesterday afternoon. Tom Hayes, 51, was killed outright and T. F. Ramsey died in a local hospital this afternoon, his body having been pierced with buckshot and his skull gashed and fractured by blows from a pick handle. The enmity between Hayes and Ramsey dates back a week or more when a small coffin and a note was found in S. T. Bagwell's veranda warning him to get out of the county. Bagwell and Ramsey are related and when the later suspicioned Tom Hayes, Ramsey became involved in the quarrels that followed.

**WHY A SOLDIER SALUTES**

The military salute so familiar to every soldier and scout dates back to very early days. At first it was not intended in the least to show respect to superiors. The upraised arm with the open palm extended was meant merely to show that the soldier did not carry a dagger in his hand and could not attack if he wanted to. An even more remarkable change has come in the meaning of the custom of retiring backward from the presence of royalty.
