M'ADOO AND ROBINSON AND OSCAR UNDERWOOD PLACED IN NOMINATION

New York, June 25.—The deep, swift currents of Democratic rivalry and dissension burst their dykes to-day in Madison Square Garden and engulfed the party's national conven-tion with a bellowing wave of con-fusion and disorder. The Ku Klux klan isue, brought at last to the open floor of the conven-tion, set off an anti-klan demonstra-

tion, set off an anti-klan demonstra-tion that swent the great hall like a tornado and led to several fist fights among delegates, but apparently brought the question no nearer a sol-

Reaching the stage of receiving nominations for the presidency, the convention also was shown in an McAdoo visible proff of the organiz-ed and driving power of the forces that are at work to influence the selection of a nominee

The name of Governor Al Smith, of New York, will be presented Thursday and his campaign organizto conclude before Thursday night, but there will be no balloting before Friday or Saturday. Convention officials hope the plat-

form will be ready for submission by Friday morning. In all about 20 candidates are to be

formally presented to the convention and only three of the nominating speeches were heard today. Alabama, heading the roll of States, placed in nomination Senator Oscar W. Underwood. Arizonaa had no nomination to present, and Arkansas presented the name of Senator Joseph T. Robinson. California's nomination of Mr. Mc-Adoo and the demonstration in his behalf brought the day's proceedings to a close.
