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

If you don't want other people to criticize you, be your own critic. Don't be an easy one either. Make your own standard higher than your boss'. Give him a little more than he expects, or a great deal more than he expects and you will attract his attention. If you don't attract his attention except unfavorably, he'll begin to hunt for somebody who will.

There are of course people who are bused as much as they think they are, but you can write on a postage stamp the names of all such persons you know. You and nobody else are to blame for your failures or responsible for your success. Be unsparing of the blame. Check up every day's work and see if it would satisfy you if you were the boss. If it wouldn't,

Nobody will be interested in your xcuses or your "alibis." Everybody will be interested in what you really complish. You can get somewhere in the world if you try. But you'll have to try extremely hard, for there will be abundant competition.

To begin with, always greet you

And always thank them, simply, for services rendered. If you call frequently at a house, and the same servant always answers the door, remember a simple word of greeting then.
