The Japanese note, conveyed in letter to Secretary Hughes and trans-Colt of the senate immigration committee, gave for the first time in concrete form the terms of the gentlemen's agreement of 1907, asserted formally that Japan had schupulously observed that covenant, and declared the very honor of the Japanese gov\_ ernment was being attacked by those who contended to the contrary.

"To Japan the question is not one of expediency, but of principle," Ambassador Hanihara said. "The important question is whether Japan as a nation is or is not emitted to the proper respect and consideration of other nations."
