Tokio, May 21.-The ambitious plans of the Imperial Government Railways of Japan for the substitution of electricity for steam power on all the government railways of the country will begin to put into effect this year, Appointment of a nelectri_ fication program marks an actual beginning on the program.

The railways department will begin electrification with the Tokaido railway, the line connecting Tokio with Kobe. During the fiscal year 1924-2b it is planned to electrify the Tokaido from Tokió as far as Kozu, 50 miles to the southwest, and also the branch line to Yokosuka, the naval base on Tokio Bay. American equipment will be largely used in the electrification
