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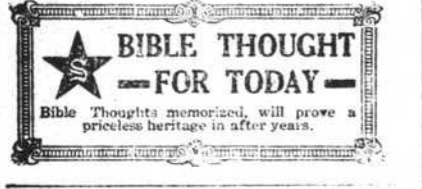
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The Tri-City Daily Gazette's immediate territory includes Leaksville, Spray, Draper and all Leaksville township, equal to a city population of 17,000.

"BLACK SPOTS ON THE MAP"

Interesting Study of Lynching Published by Interracial Commission

"Black spots on the map" is the title of an interesting study of lynching published for free contribution by the Commission on Interracial Cooperation, with headquarters in Atlanta. The booklet gives in brief compass the more important facts about lynchings in the United States during the last forty years, showing the number of victims by race and sex, the offenses for which they were lynched, means which have proved effective in curbing lynching, and hopeful indications that point to the ultimate eradication of the habit.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of the booklet, and the one from which it takes its name, is a series of four maps, state and national showing the number of victims in each state and the sections where lynchings have been most common. The exhibit reveals the fact that often a relatively small area is responsible for most of the lynchings charged to the whole state, a condition which is represented as "a challenge to the law-abiding majority."

Special legislation help to curb lynching, the booklet states, but the final responsibility rests on public sentiment. The preachers, teachers and good citizens cease to condone the habit, either actively or by their silence.

VICTIM OF HAMMER ATTACK CONTINUES BATTLE FOR LIFE

New Brunswick, N. J., June 23.—Seventeen year old Veronica Schultz, victim of a hammer attack said by the police to have been committed Friday night by George Mier, 18, while the pair were riding in his automobile, tonight continued her battle against death. Her condition was very serious, physicians said.

Mier, who was arrested late Saturday night after Miss Schultz during a moment of consciousness named him as her assailant, today, according to the police, issued a statement in which he explained he struck the girl after she became violently ill from drinking whiskey which he said was purchased just a few minutes before.

WILL NOT FORCLOSE ON C. & V. BONDHOLDERS

(By Associated Press) New York, June 24.—The financial understanding that the committee for the first mortgage bondholders of the Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company which has been given right to foreclose on bonds, will not exercise this right. Action was taken, it was said, to protect bondholders rather than to liquidate their holdings.

UTAH SCHOOL CHILDREN FED ANTI-GOITRE TABLETS WEEKLY

(By Associated Press) Salt Lake City, June 24.—Chocolate tablets containing ten milligrams of iodine each are to be given Utah school children every week as a means of counteracting goitre, according to a notice issued by state health officials. A recent survey showed approximately 41 per cent of the school boys and school girls to be afflicted. A deficiency of iodine in the drinking water consumed by the children is the reason for the great number of goitre cases, according to Dr. J. Walker, state epidemiologist.

GAS METER COURSE FOR STATE COLLEGE

Raleigh, N. C., June 24.—Gas metermen from a majority of the southeastern states will gather at the North Carolina State College here Monday, July 7th for a week of intensive study.

North and South Carolina will be largely represented and a number will be registered from Florida, Tennessee, Alabama, Virginia, Maryland and Louisiana also. The course will be under the direction of Dr. L. L. Vaughan, Professor of Mechanics, Engineering at State College. Co-operating with the college authorities are officials of the Southern Gas Association and the Southern Motorists' Association, of which E. T. Poulson, of the Carolina Power & Light Company, Wilmington, Vice-President; and B. J. Brown, Southern Power Company, Charlotte, Secretary and Treasurer.

For the benefit of the metermen who attend the course, experts from the meter manufacturing industry have been engaged to assist as lecturers. It has been recognized that the gas meter is an intricate instrument and the public regarding its workings. The result aimed at in the proposed course is more intelligent service and greater benefit to the public.

The metermen who will take this course are expected to register at Holiday Hall, State College, on Monday afternoon, July 7th. The first session will be at 7:30 o'clock Monday evening and will be followed by a smoker. According to Professor Vaughan the schedule of lectures has been so arranged as to take advantage of every hour of the day and evening.

It has been decided to issue certificates of proficiency in gas meter handling. And to determine the qualifications of those taking the course, questions will be distributed which must be answered and returned to the college to determine whether or not the student is entitled to a college certificate.

It is estimated that the expenses of the course will be not more than \$20.00 for each student.

MEN ALLEGED TO HAVE BEEN DRUNK WHEN HORSE WAS KILLED SUNDAY NIGHT

The brutal killing of a valuable horse Sunday night on the Spray-Draper road when three drunken men in a car ran into the horse breaking both front legs. The rider jumped with slight injuries. The horse was the property of John Westley Haizip, student at a military school. The young man was returning to Spray about ten o'clock Sunday night near Mrs. Cox place, when the car struck the horse.

Chief Vernon is determined to find the parties and see that they are suitably punished. He is asking people to be on the lookout for a car that might show signs of blood stains as the horse was bleeding badly.

SUMS UP REAL ISSUES

Mr. McAdoo summed up the real issues of the 1924 campaign, as follows:

"To repeal the obnoxious features of special privilege, corruption and graft, and to prosecute all persons, whether civilians or officials, guilty of conspiracy to defraud or cheat the government."

"To remove the influence of invisible government from the treasury and the federal reserve system."

"To aid the farmers by establishing a tariff bill, which taxes common people for the benefit of special interests and to substitute a tariff bill which will help reduce the cost of living and do justice to all interests."

"To repeal the obnoxious features of Each-Cummins railroad act and to set up in its stead a measure for railroad reform which will eliminate waste, reduce transportation costs, cut freight rates and insure the operation of the railroads for the benefit of the country."

"To aid the farmers by establishing lower freight rates and by developing foreign markets which can absorb the surplus agricultural crops."

"To end the era of isolation and begin the era of co-operation in foreign affairs, to promote peace and further reduce the burden of both land and sea armaments to the lowest point compatible with national safety."

"To protect the natural resources of the nation, particularly water power, which must be developed in the interest of the people and not exploited for private advantage."

"To practice genuine economy in the equality of rights, civil, economic and social, for women."

"To practice genuine economy in government and progressively reduce taxes to the lowest basis consistent with efficient government and justice to deserving employes in the public service."

"To vigorously enforce all laws. To say that they cannot be enforced is not only to confess governmental impotence but failure of democratic institutions."
