GERMAN COLLEGE STUDENTS DEMAND REDUCED TUITION

(By Associated Press) Berlin, July 9.-The students of state institutions in Prussia have threatened to boycott lectures and classes unless the fees for attending colleges and universities are cut to one-third of the present amounts. The threat was made at a meeting recently of representatives of the studenunions of all Prussian higher insti tutions of learning.

The students represetatives de clared that the students economically are not in a position to afford the fees fixed by the Prussian ministry of culture and education. They denied that the students have gone on strike but said that the pecuniary distres of the students compe's many o. them not to pay their fees and to remain away from the lecture.

It is said that a bill will be introduced in the Prussian diet to provide public funds to make up the differ ence between the fees now asked and those suggested by the students.
