Stormbound for five days in one of the worst spots on the whole Atlantic coast, Mr. Dempsey Wood returned Inter-Oceanic Line to Vera Cruz belate in the past week from a cruise through Pamlico' sound, which was Jalapa, on November 12, according to not a very pleasant one. Mr. Wood and others of a small party left to make a visit to each of the East Carolina sounds on a small yacht. They were off Ocracoke, in Pamlico sound, last Monday when a heavy gale struck their little ship. There was no chance of making the passage through the sound in the weather, and the yacht was anchored right at the entrance to Portsmouth inlet, a short, shallow and very narrow passage, very seldom used as a ship channel because of its treacherousness. The anchor held: had it not, with the wind from the quarter it was most of the time, the little vessel would have been blown to sea or stranded, with a still less chance of weathering the tempest, in the inlet. Thursday the gale abated, but the seas continued so high and the current so strong that it was not until Friday that the crew could take up anchor and leave the place. There was no suffering on board. The yacht was quite comfortable and well provisioned, but frequently there were tense moment+ when "most anything could have happened." The anchor was the means of salvation, all right.
