HISTORY OF THE 1873 COINAGE ACT.

(Continued from first page.) gold, and in denial of the assertion that any conspiracy whatever attended the framing and passage of this act, and in proof that neither domestic or foreign debts up to and prior to 1873 were paid with silver dollars, except possibly the obligation of that peculiarly virtuous class who gloried in paying all their foreign debts with a silver dollar at a premium rather than with a gold dollar worth only par, and who felt themselves so aggrieved and outraged by being deprived of this special privilege by this act, and whom Gen. Hardin, in his Louisville speech, designates by the term "we," without furnishing any evidence or clew whatsoever as to whom "we" refers.

Elections Tuesday.

The result of the State elections held last Tuesday was disastrous to the Democrats generally. The State of New York went 80,000 Republican, but New York City went 40,000 Democratic and Tammany is again on top.

Gorman was beaten in Maryland by 10,000 or more. John E. Hurst will continue to sell dry goods while Loyd Lowndes, Republican, acts as governor.

New Jersey is also Republican by something like 15,000. A Republican governor is elected, the first in years.

Massachusetts is Republican by 65,000. Greenhalge is elected governor for third term.
