Call to Democrats. The Democrats of Lincoln, by order of the executive committee, will meet in township conventions on Saturday, August 22, to express their preference for a candidate for Register of Deeds for Lincoln county to fill the vacancy on the ticket made by the withdrawal of R. H. Dellinger on account of certain dissatisfaction with the former county convention. Any precinct chairman will call their township meetings to order and appoint two poll holders, one from each side of the Dellinger-Cratt contest. The voting will begin at one o'clock p. m. on the above date and the polls will close at 6 o'clock. The various primaries by delegates will report the result of the primaries to the county convention, to be held in Lincolnton on August 29th, at 12 m.

According to the action of the executive committee, a plurality of the popular vote will determine who shall be the nominee for Register of Deeds. The primaries may be held at any place designated by the township executive committee in their respective township, provided there must not be any more voting places than the usual number allowed said townships.

The townships will appoint delegates as follows: North Brook 4; Howard's Creek 10; Lincolnton 11; Ironton 6; Catawba Springs 6. These delegates will represent their respective townships and convey the vote of their townships to the county convention.
