

Teaching Them English.

The simple and effective method of teaching English to the children of Italians, Portuguese, Polish and German Jews, used in the North End schools of Boston, might profitably be adopted by other cities which are obliged to face the fact that within their borders are thousands of foreign children who know nothing of the customs, institutions or language of this country.

The children, within a few days after their arrival are sent to the public schools, as a rule without compulsion, and here they are first of all taught the English language. It is done by a system of object-lessons. The teachers in the elementary rooms are young women, as men would not be patient enough to accomplish the best results.

The teacher may point to her eye, and say, "This is my eye," repeating it several times and requiring the pupils to repeat it in unison. Other portions of the body are pointed out in a similar manner, and then familiar objects in the room are in the same way brought to the attention of the children.

Later, when they have made sufficient progress in the language, it becomes desirable to teach the different tenses. To accomplish this, a boy or girl is directed to run slowly round the room, when the teacher and children say in unison: "That boy is running," repeating the sentence several times. The boy is then told to halt, and the teacher and pupils say in unison: "That boy did run." Again: "That boy can run." "That boy is walking." "That boy walks fast." "I can walk." "I can run." "I can walk," etc.

These and other sentences, as they are spoken, are written on the blackboard by teacher, and the pupils write them on their slates. Thus they are taught the language, and taught to spell, read and write simultaneously.—Youth's Companion.

Li Hung Chang.

The Observer is hospitable to the Hon. Li Hung Chang, of China. Gen. Grant, who met the Chinese Premier on his journey around the world, ranked him as a statesman in the same class with Bismark and Gladstone. He is a great man, Li is, and as he is now on the swing around the circle, taking an international outing, as it were, we will soon have the pleasure of seeing him, for his next landing place is on the shores of this home of the brave and land of the free. We have, as we have just intimated, a great admiration for Li. When his country was being outstripped in the recent war with Japan, which had civilized herself while China was asleep, Li Hung Chang was the brains of China's army and government—what little of either there was. Because he didn't succeed against the fine discipline of Japan, he was deprived of a great many of his honors. They made him shuck his Yellow Jacket first, and then made him shed his Three Tipped Peacock Feather—all of which amounted to the same as being court-martialed and disgraced in this country, but Li held his peace, and his crowd soon found that they could not get along without him, so they sent for him to patch up peace with victorious Japan. Now there is another thing that makes the Observer hospitable to Li. He sent for an American lawyer to aid him in this delicate diplomatic duty. He and Mr. Foster, as will be well remembered, drew up the terms of peace. Li Hung cannot stay long with us. He has already heard in the short time he has been absent from his Empire of a plot to depose him from power, and he must needs hasten home to frustrate it. Li is an oriental flatterer. It is said of him that while in England, where he is now, he "has shown himself willing to listen to all the nice things which the English statesmen and the royal family wished to say of him, and he has snavely made a liberal response from his sweet store of Oriental compliments, without once putting his tongue in his cheek when uttering them."

His wonderful insight into the political affairs of the countries he visits, and his fine judgment of the human nature of all nations stand him well instead. He already shows, as a result of a few weeks' travel, a wonderfully clear insight into the essential differences between his people and those of the younger nations. He said, in a speech at the China Association banquet in London: "You are well aware of the deep-rooted habit of the mass of our people to fix their thoughts exclusively on the past, only a few daring even to make provision for the inevitable. With you Western people I know everything is just the reverse, for here I find everywhere eager anticipation of the future, while it is only a few scholars and philosophers who may be said to live in the past."

"But that being so, no one would be so sanguine as to expect to change the current of thought of a people so numerous as the Chinese in a single generation. Time must be allowed, and also a good deal of patience and forbearance before China as a whole could be brought to regard international affairs from the same standpoint as that of the people of the West."

"In the meantime, however, you gentlemen and myself, in what remains to me of life, may do something towards so desirable a result. You may, perhaps, be surprised when I tell you that the basis of all real progress on the part of China towards the rational ideas of other countries in conservatism. The first essential is that our integrity be observed, for if that be threatened or if the prestige of the government be seriously impaired we have no alternative but anarchy, which with us means general and prolonged devastation."

One of the supremest evidences of the greatness of Li Hung Chang is the way in which he has tackled the inevitable newspaper interview horror of the Occident. He is always equal to the occasion, and pines his would-be interviewer with so many questions that he himself is the interviewer, and the other fellow is the interviewed. A young American woman who essayed to interview him in London was immediately asked, by the Chinese Prince who, State she hailed from, how were the members of her family, if she earned her own living, and what income her pen brought her. Then his questions became more searching. He asked her, was she married, why not, when did she expect to be, until finally she, in desperation, retorted: "But your excellency, I came to interview you, and you are interviewing me." Whereupon, the story goes, Li and 50 Chinamen who were present burst out laughing.

But isn't Li an interesting old chap?—Charlotte Observer.

How the House Elects. There has been much talk of the election of President by the National House of Representatives, but there is a good deal of misunderstanding as to what representation each State is entitled in such case. After the electors have voted at their various State capitals and the returns have been sent to the President of the Senate, the Senate and House of Representatives meet in joint session on the second Wednesday in February. The President of the Senate opens the certificates of votes from all the states and they are counted. If no man has a majority of all the electors of all the states the House of Representatives elects a man from among the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes. A quorum for the purpose is a representative or representatives from two-thirds of all the states. Each state has but one vote, cast as a majority of its representatives decide, and a majority of all the states is necessary to elect.

Suggestion to County Clerks.

We wish to call the special attention of County Clerks to section 7, of the new election law. It provides:

That on or before the first Monday of September next, preceding every election, the clerks in their several counties shall appoint, upon the written recommendation of approval of the chairman of the state executive committee of each political party of the state, one citizen and qualified voter from each of said political parties of and for each election precinct, who shall be able to read and write the English language, and who shall be known, for the duties required of them under this act, as registrars of election in their respective precincts. And on or before the first Monday of the month next preceding any election, the clerk shall appoint, upon the recommendation of the respective chairmen as aforesaid, one citizen and qualified voter of each party, as aforesaid, and for each election precinct, able to read and write as aforesaid, who shall be known, for the duties required of them under this act, as judges of election in their respective precincts; and the registrars and judges of election, when so appointed and qualified, shall constitute the precinct board of election.
