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CLAIMING BRYAN. JONES GIVES IT UP.

With Strange Persistency the Claims Get Warmer.

JONES SAYS HE'S ELECTED.

The Chairman Gives Out Another Explicit Statement.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 4.—Senator Jones issued the following statement to-night: "I have counted from the beginning as the States upon which we relied for Mr. Bryan's election, the Southern States, with 156 votes, and the States west of the Missouri, with 61 votes, making a total of 217. I have hoped that we would carry Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. I believe that we have carried all of the Southern States except Maryland, and that we have carried all of the Western States heretofore counted on, which leaves us, not counting Delaware, which I think we have carried, and which I have not heretofore calculated on, 509 votes. One vote we certainly have in Delaware, and probably 4. But counting only one vote, which we have beyond doubt, it leaves necessary to a choice 14 votes. Either Michigan or Indiana would give us those 14 votes. The reports received by us from both those States make encouragement and lead us to believe that while both States are close, that we have the better chance to win each and that we may probably carry both.

There can be scarcely a doubt of our getting Indiana.

Under these circumstances, it seems to me, that we are entirely justified in claiming the election of Mr. Bryan, which I do, and believe that the temper of the people is such that they will not allow their choice to be defeated by tricks and frauds. The statements made in city papers to-day that I have given up the contest and admitted Mr. Bryan is a deliberate purpose on the part of the papers, as well as the Republican managers, to create false impressions in the minds of the people and to lead them to believe that McKinley's election is accomplished and acquiesced on.

THE STATE WAVING.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 4.—The Evening Post and Evening Times (both gold Democratic) claim the State for McKinley by 5,000, while the Republican State committee reduce their claim to 2,500, with returns from three Congressional districts incomplete.—News and Observer.

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The Chairman Says No Longer Any Doubt.

BRYAN SURE OF 100.

Democrats Bow to the Decision in Contrast to Threats From Other Side.

CHICAGO, ILL., Nov. 5.—Chairman Jones issued the following statement to-night: "The result of the Presidential election is apparently no longer in doubt. It has been one of the closest contests that the people have been called on to determine in recent years. We have claimed the election on our advices from States that were admittedly in doubt, in which we know there had been many frauds and from which there were evidences of tampering with the returns. It seems now to be apparent that while Mr. Bryan, after making the most brilliant campaign in the history of our country and having carried most of the States claimed to be doubtful, has not carried enough to assure his success in the electoral college. Bryan electors have been chosen from all of the States south of the Potomac and Ohio, except West Virginia, and all those west of the Missouri, except California and Oregon. He has 190 electoral votes and this number may be increased by final returns from states yet in question. He has not obtained enough votes to carry the electoral college. Thus this remarkable campaign closes with the election of Wm. McKinley. The result was brought about by every kind of coercion and intimidation on the part of the money power, including threats of lockouts and dismissals and impending starvation; by the employment of by far the largest campaign fund ever used in this country and by subordination of a large portion of the American press.

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A Civil Service Order.

The President issued an order Tuesday directing that the regulations of the Navy Department governing the employment of labor at the navy yards should not be changed without the approval of the civil service commission. He has also placed the ordinance department in the classified service under civil service rules. This adds about 2,100 employees to the classified service. He had also classified examiners in the Department of Justice and excepted from examination attorneys or assistant attorneys in any Department whose main duties are connected with the management of cases in court.

Kitchin and Linney Win.

WINSTON, N. C. Nov. 4.—It is about conceded to-night that Linney, Republican has defeated Doughton, silver Democrat for Congress in the Eighth district by one thousand votes. This is a decreased Republican majority of about two thousand from two years ago. Returns received indicate that Kitchin, silver Democrat, has defeated Congressman Settle, in the Fifth district by a majority of twelve hundred.—News and Observer.
