HEAD-ON COLLISION.

Two Freight Trains Collide at Kings Mountain. Engineer De Witt Killed.

It was learned this morning that there had been a head on collision between two freight trains near Kings Mountain at 5 a. m. The two trains were going at full speed. Engineer De Witt was instantly killed. The rest of the crews escaped death as by a miracle. Our information does not enable us to state where the blame for the disaster rests.

Later News From Atlanta

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 21.—The day has passed without serious troubles following the riots of Saturday and Sunday morning. Unconfirmed rumors of a white man killed by negroes and of a negro being shot to pieces by enraged whites have been heard. Governor Terrell has ordered to Atlanta seven companies of the State Militia, two companies from Macon and one from each of the following places: Jackson, Barnesville, Griffin, Rome and Lu-dale. These companies have arrived and are on duty in the streets. With the local companies, the force of militia on duty is something more than a thousand men, besides a battery of light artillery held in reserve.

Although urgently requested from many sources to declare martial law, Governor Terrell has so far declined to do so. He said tonight that if the scenes of last night shall be repeated he will not hesitate to put the military in supreme control. Mayor Woodward has urged that the city and county police, with the militia, are amply able to handle the situation. The local soldiers and police, who have been on duty since midnight, will be held in reserve tonight and the fresher men have been put on active duty. The entire city is being patrolled, both in the center and in the residence districts, where great anxiety has been experienced last night and as to today's possibilities. Mayor Woodward has issued a request that all citizens, white and black, remain off the streets tonight. He announced that he will order all saloons closed to-morrow morning—all day if necessary. All boys under 21 years have been ordered to keep off the streets. It was the consensus of opinion during the early evening that if tonight shall pass without serious disturbance no further trouble need be expected.

Mr. James Wyatt died at his home in Union township Saturday from injuries received in trying to put a belt on a pulley while the machinery was in motion. His arm was caught between the belt and pulley and was so horribly mangled that amputation was resorted to. He leaves a wife and two children.—Patriot.
