The Letter, in question, was written in 1836 anticipation of a state of things, which did t occur. It was therefore not made public, nd I fear has not been preserved. At least, ter a diligent search among my papers, I ve been unable to find it. Its contents, wever, are perfectly within my recollection, ind I do all that is in my power to comply th your request, by stating them, as I have done to the Editor of the Telegraph. The Letter embraced three points :-

1. Gen. Harrison denied the right of Conress to abolish slavery in the states, or in District of Columbia.

2. He expressed the opinion that the Tariff compromise ought to remain undisturbed. 3. He repudiated the practice of making pointments to office, the reward of partisan

This was the purport of the letter. I did t ask Gen. Harrison's opinion because I obted it. Having been in intimate intercourse with him for several years, I knew that his views on these subjects were accornt with my own.
