The Senate was called to order by President King at 11 o'clock and prayer was offered by Rev. J. B. Hurley, pastor of Cental M. E.

Mr. Lucas presented a petition to repeal the homestead law from Bladen county.

Mr. Leatherwood introduced a bill authorizing railroad companies to grant passes to orphans and to persons traveling in their aid.

Mr. James introduced a bill for the benefit of laborers.
