WAS IT A TRAGEDY?

## John Taylor Found Dead.

Jno. Taylor, a one armed negro, who lives a few miles from town, found dead on the side of the Batfalo Shoals road, about 71 miles from Lincolnton, last Saturday morning. How his death was brought about is enveloped in mystery. Coroner J. B. Heim was called to the scene soon after the body was found. A jury of inquest was summoned and the investigation as to cause of death was dilligently prosecoted. The jury adjourned Saturday night and met again Monday 10 the court house at 10 o'clock and the inquiry prolonged for some time, but no evidence could be secured against any one. The investigation showed that Juo. Taylor, in company with an old white man, J. A. Starnes had gone to a distillery together on Thursday, got some whisky and returned togethat toward homes. They were seen sitting on the roadside on Thursday and on Friday. Starnes stated that they had sat down by the roadside Thursday evening, that he had gone to sleep and that he had remained there till Friday evening when he was found by a colored man. The latter took Starnes up behind him on his mule and took him home. Taylor was found dead about 30 yds from where Starnes was found. Starnes and Taylor lay



# Death Of Capt. J. F. Speck.

The many friends in Lincolnton E S Massev, O S. of Capt. Jno. F. Speck were pained to learn of his death which occured at Palatka Fla., Feb. 20, 1893, aged about 52 years. He had been a constant sufferer for several years from brouchial affectious and was confined to his room for about 8 months previous to his death. The

deceased was born at Statesville, N. C., July 19, 1841. He was living in Lincolnton when the war between the states broke out and he entered the Confederate service as sergeant in the Southern Star Company K | Maj. Clark, but too near Raleigh of North Carolina Volunteers. In a short time be returned, organized a company and was elec 1 captain. On December 20, 1804, be was wounded in the battle of Fredericks burg and lost a leg.

After the war he lived in Lincolnton until 1886, when he went to Palatka Fia, and went into business with his son, W. H. Speck. In 1888 he returned to North Caro. lina and opened up business in Charlotte. Later be moved to Newberry, S. C., and last November he went back to Palatka Fla. Capt. Speck for a number of years run a first class jewelry business in Lincolnton. He was a pub, lic spirited man and was always ready to aid in pushing any laudible public enterprise.,

The deceased was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church, and leaves one daughter, five sons and a large circle of friends to mourn his death.
