This county, once one of the largest in the State, has been so reduced by the formation of other counties from its territory as to be one of the smallest. It, bowever. retains much of its former consequence, owing to the ductiveness of its soil, the variety of its crops, the value of its ores, and its fine water-power and cousequent adaption of the uses

It produces tobacco of good quality and in considerable quanity, and a cotton crop of about 4,000 bales, besides wheat, corn and other grains. It is naturally the home of the grape, and it is here the celebrated Lincoln grape had its origin. It has been long noted for its productive iron mines, which have been worked since ante-Revolutionary days. It has abundant waters power, both from the main stream of the Catawba River and from the South Fork of the same stream, and upon both of them are large factories

IRON ORES.

In the counties of Gaston. Lincolu and Catawba is one of the most extensive ore ranges in the State, as well as the best known, for it has been extensively worked for nearly a bundred and twenty. five years, and has been the princt. pal source of the domestic supply of trop during that period, The ores are sometimes magnetic, but more frequently hematitic, and are found in the talcose and quartzitic schists, sometimes called the Kings Mountain slates (Huronian): body of schists gradually narrows towards the north east of the Catawba River ; to the south it exlends into South Carolina. This range naturrally divides itself into two sections-the northern in Lincoln and Catawba, the southern in Gaston and in South Carolina.

Fatal Boiler Explosion at Forest City.

The boiler of the Florence Cotton Mills, at Forest City, burst this morning, killing the fireman, Homer Harroll, instantly, and wounding seriously engineer Saunders and a young man named Dean. The accident occured at 7 o'clock, soon after the bands had commenced work. The damage will amount to a considerable sum and will necessitate the mill stopping for some little while. The News was unable to get full particulars of the terrible accident and the exact amount of damage resulting there from .-Charlotte News, 13ht.

Further Particulars.

The News yesterday afternoon contained an account of the explosion at the Florence Cotton Mills in Forest City. Additional news from there today is to the effect that the damage sustained by the explosion will be more than was at first anticipated. The engine room and the portion of the building adjacent was completely wrecked. Brick, mortar and timber flew through the air at a rapid rate. The botler was blown into atoms. Another boiler near by that weighed five tons was blown fifty yards from its position.
