—Supt. effect Has Qualified. This is to say: That A. Nixon has qualified as Supt. of Pub. Inst. Lincoln county, and the office work was turned over to him on Monday Oct. 2. I take pleasure in making this announcement and request Pub. School Committees and teachers to report to Mr. Nixon and confer with him on all school matters and file with him all business requiring the attention of the Board of Education. He will distribute Blanks for annual census returns in November and the appropriations for the current school year will be made at the next regular meeting of the Board on 1st Monday in January 1894. The next examination day will find the Supt. in the office on that day. All correspondence through the mails will hereafter be directed to the Supt. so well known throughout the county and to whom the board has turned over the office.

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County Matters.

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular order last Monday. K. M. Roseman Chm. present and presiding. The following proceeding were had:

Report of K. M. Roseman Chm. and B. C. Wood the committee appointed to make settlement with representative of the late L. T. Wilkie Treasurer, was filed approved and ordered spread upon the minutes. R. M. Roseman Chm. was appointed a committee to have the eastern approach to iron bridge banistered.

David Cherry was authorized to have a bid placed in Yorkville road below Triangle, repaired, and draw on County Treasurer for one half of expenses not to exceed \$10. A Nixon Co Supt of Pub Inst elect filed oath of office which was approved. W. M. Hull was appointed committee to have bridge near Jenks Woolen Mills repaired. The Treasurer was authorized to pay interest on note outstanding against county. Joe A. Stamey's land, was reduced for taxes from \$1000 to \$775. Adolphus Shall was released from poll tax 1893 on account of defective eyes.

The number of students now registered in all departments of the University is in all 361, the largest number since the palmy days of 1860 and the decade previous. There has entered this year, however, the largest Freshman class in the history of the institution.
