### Engineer and Fireman Killed.

Tryon, Aug. 13.—A through freight train, the third section of No. 62, from Asheville to Spartanburg, S. C., ran away on Saluda Mountain at 2:15 p. m., to-day. The engine and 13 coal cars were wrecked near Melrose, the exact place where Engineer Tunstall's train was wrecked several years ago. The engine and 11 cars are a total wreck, piled up and demolished in the cut. Engineer J. H. Averill, Jr., of Asheville, and Fireman Hair, of Asheville, are killed, and are under the wreck and cannot be found until the wreck is cleared away. Brakeman W. B. Sherrill, of Spartanburg, has both legs cut off.

Engineer Averill was a bright young man, 24 years of age, a son of Colonel J. H. Averill, of Charleston. His father, mother, wife and two little children, brother and sisters, are spending the summer at Saluda, within three miles of where he met his untimely death. He stayed on his engine with the faithful fireman, doing all he could to check the speed of the train until the engine buried him. As the runaway train passed Melrose, the operator, J. W. Heaverty, ran out and Fireman Hair threw up his hands and smiled. Heaverty faintly. Conductor Howie and Flagman Bishop and Ward were unhurt.

### Captured After Eighteen Years Freedom.

Twenty years ago the house of Mrs. Lavonia Johnson, near Buck Shoals, Yadkin county, was entered in the day time while the family was away from home, and robbed of a lot of bacon, meat and other things. Suspicion rested upon one Tom Cuddy and a search for the stolen articles revealed them in his possession. He was tried in York Superior Court, convicted and sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary. After serving two years of his sentence he made his escape and for 18 years he has been hiding and evading from place to place. Last week George and Tom Marshall captured him and carried him back to Raleigh, where he will serve the remainder of his term.

### Folly of Profanity.

The Tampa Tribune remarks that many a young man and woman could be reclaimed from the silt of profanity if he could only be reached by the direct address of some good man or woman who would simply prove to him that profanity is the act of a fool. This not only those who practice profanity themselves should be in others, which is entirely true. Boys learn it from their fathers and older brothers. But fathers and older brothers seldom resist the temptation of their own planting. It is almost inevitable that a boy should learn to swear than a woman, except of the lowest order, rarely swear. If any of them did, they could not get a moderately decent man to court near them. There have been cases where wives, driven to her treatment of the habit of profanity in their husbands, have made a feat of adjusting that habit themselves. It has generally effected a cure, although the Tribune cannot advise any one to proceed to desperateness in this. But do not the simple facts that this paper has stated demonstrate the essential folly and grossness of profanity?

### About Jury Duty.

Say what you may, if every citizen of the country were willing to sit on the jury as he is to vote, there would be less criticism of the verdicts rendered and court proceedings. And as we see it, one is as much a duty to the State as the other. It is the privilege and duty of every good and capable citizen to exercise the right of suffrage by casting his ballot in every election by the people; and so, too, it is the duty of every good citizen to serve the State as a juror whenever called upon to do so, unless some presidential hindrance comes in his way.

### Had Done Some Hunting.

"Did I ever do much hunting?" "Ho, ho!" said Felix Fib, "I should appreciate an affirmative reply, for, by the way, several times I've hunted every thing from crickets to herds of buffalo sixteen miles apart. I was born in the wilds of the wilderness, I was a cabin built of dry bones; was swaddled in the skin of a wild bear dripping with blood, warmed by the breath of a she hyena, fed on the milk of a gnu, and sung to sleep by the howl of wolves. The companions of my boyhood were all lion-headed and the first rattlesnake my 52' ever shot down on was a quadruple, double action, blue-steeled, automatic, revolver gun. I've been up against tigers so big you could see nothing but stripes, no matter in what direction you looked. I've shot elephants that could out a railroad. I've killed snakes that a surgeon couldn't save in a month. I've captured gophers that had to be kept down from this moon—besides enough of small beasts to drink the ocean dry.

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### A Negro Commits Suicide.

Last Thursday afternoon John Lockhart, colored, aged about 43 years, committed suicide at the home of Charles Tillman, colored, who lives on the Ansonville road, five miles from town. Lockhart was Tillman's house and told his wife (Charles was not at home) that he had seen a large rattlesnake a short distance from the house and asked her to let him have a gun to kill it with. The woman gave him her husband's gun and went back in the house for her lantern, intending to go with Lockhart to see him kill the snake. As soon as the woman turned her back Lockhart placed the butt of the gun against a small piece of wood in the yard and the muzzle against his left breast. Having already cocked the gun, he then pushed the trigger with a stick he held in his hand, discharging it, and sending the entire load of squibbed shot through his heart, killing him instantly.

Lockhart was a son of Peter Lockhart, the old blacksmith, and was reared in the neighborhood where he killed himself, but had been wandering around the country about 10 years. He had only returned home the day before the tragedy.

Lockhart, a short time before he killed himself, tried to get a gun from Mr. S. W. Blackburn, who lives on Messrs. W. B. and W. R. Lockhart's place, but that gentleman refused to let him have it. No reason is known why Lockhart should have taken his life.

### The Idea of Culture.
