General Bradley Johnson Dead.
 Richmond, Va., Oct. 5.—General Bradley T. Johnson died early this morning at the home of his son, Bradley S. Johnson, at Rock Castle, in Gloucester county. Bright's disease is assigned as the cause of death. The body of the dead soldier will be conveyed to Baltimore for burial beside the grave of his wife. It is understood that a Confederate veteran escort of honor will accompany the body to the place of burial. The body will reach Richmond tomorrow evening and will be taken at noon to Baltimore. In the interim the casket containing the body will be in the state in the rotunda of the capitol.

General Johnson was born in Frederick City, Md., September 29, 1829, and came of a distinguished Maryland family, one of his ancestors having been a governor of that State. He lived at Frederick City until he came South to take part in the war. He married a daughter of Judge Saunders, of North Carolina, at one time American minister to Spain. Two children were born—a daughter, who died, and a son, Bradley S. Johnson, who lives at Rock Castle, and who has one son, now a cadet at Annapolis, having been appointed by President Roosevelt himself.

General Johnson was a graduate at Princeton in 1849, receiving the mathematical oration, studied law at Harvard, was admitted to the bar in Maryland in 1854, and was elected State attorney there in November of that year. He was the Democratic candidate for comptroller of North Carolina in 1857, chairman of the State Central Committee in 1859-'60, delegate to the National Democratic convention at Charleston and Baltimore in 1860, and withdrew with the majority of the Maryland delegation from the convention and united in the nomination of Breckenridge and Lane.

At the beginning of the war between the States he organized and armed a company at his own expense, which was assigned to the service of the Confederate States. He served with distinction in the Confederate Army rising to the grade of brigadier general. After the war he settled in Richmond, and was State Senator from this district. He was prominent in the re-adjustment in Virginia, stoutly opposing Mahone. Later, he returned to Maryland, settling in Baltimore and recently he had come to Virginia again making his home in Amelia county.
