**Major Graham Says This Was the Sense of the Big Meeting at Montgomery — Hold for 15 Cents.**

Commissioner of Agriculture, Major William A. Graham, who has lately returned from the Montgomery cotton conference, has given the Daily News of Greensboro an interesting interview in regard to the purposes of that conference and also in regard to general cotton conditions as he has observed them. Major Graham is confident that fifteen cents will be received for the staple if the farmers abide by the decision of that convention in setting this figure as a minimum.

In an interview with The News Major Graham said the reason the convention was called was because the Secretary of Agriculture of the United States gave a statement that the cotton crop was more than 14,000,000 bales. "The Secretary was perhaps correct," he said, "for, at the time the prospects for the crop had never been exceeded in the history of the cotton-raising States, and a great many States had reported the condition at 100 per cent or more, so the Secretary was not much to blame for the estimate.

"By the middle of July the crop began to deteriorate in almost every State, in North and South Carolina by the drought, and many other States through the excessive rains. These rains were favorable to the boll weevil, the worm and the caterpillar, all of which made their appearance and began to work a serious injury. The boll weevil has effected each crop for the past 8 or 10 years, but the boll worm and the caterpillar have not done serious damage for 10 years past. The estimate of the Secretary of Agriculture was received as probably a true amount of the crop. The price was based on this, and as a result of the conditions, fell to from 15 cents to 12 cents. This being the condition of affairs, and Alabama being affected by the decline in the probable amount, the Governor of Alabama, in conjunction with the Commissioners of Agriculture of Alabama and Georgia, called the meeting of the Commissioners of Agriculture of the cotton States, to which was invited not only the farmers interested, but also the bankers, merchants and others whose profits depend on the farmers receiving a remunerative price for their goods.

"The object aimed at was to get as far as possible a correct estimate as to the amount of the crop. Each commissioner by correspondence or observation endeavored to get a true statement as to the average crop in each State. At the farmers' convention in Raleigh, August 29 to 31, the delegates from the different counties were asked to report on the respective counties as compared with the yield of last year. Reports were obtained from all but nine, and for these the reports from adjoining counties as to the increase or decrease were used. Allowing for 8 per cent increase in acreage, the amount of the crop for North Carolina was estimated at 60,000 bales, and at the Montgomery meeting all the reports were collected. The amount of the total crop was then estimated at 12,000,000.

"Three reports were received from different sources, one from the Commissioner of Agriculture, which made the amount 11,640,000 bales; one from the farmers' union at their meeting in Oklahoma, 11,747,000, and another from such other sources as the delegates to the convention could furnish, 12,130,000. This made the average amount a little less

like California or Missouri, which usually grow small amounts, the task of estimating was placed in the hands of a committee on statistics, of which I was chairman, and estimated the yield at 12,500,000.

"There is more of the cotton crop open at this time than perhaps at any other year in history. The red spider and the wilt have caused many plants to shed leaves and there is no possibility of any further yield in such cases. For this reason the convention thought that the crop should command 15 cents a pound, and advised the farmers to hold for that amount.

"September will show perhaps the largest number of bales ginned in that month at any time, and the receipts in October will be very large. If the cotton can be gathered, four-fifths will be ready for the market by November 1, and to obtain profitable prices for it the farmers must hold and not glut the market with larger offerings than the demand. A bale of cotton is now better security than the goods manufactured from it are, and there will be no difficulty in the farmers obtaining from the banks the money necessary to hold the crop where they desire to do so."
