"By the middle of July the crop began to deterioate in almost every State, in North and South Carolina by the drought. and many other States through the excessive rains. These rains were favorable to the boll weevil, the worm and the caterpillar, all of which made their appearance and began to work a serious injury. The boll weevil has effeeted each crop for the past 8 or 10 years, but the boll worm and the eaterpillar have not done serious damage for 10 years past. The estmate of the Secretary of Agriculture was received as probably a true amount of the erop. The price was based on this, and as a result of the conditions, fell to from 15 cents to 12 cents. This being the condition of affairs, and Alabama being affected by the decline in the probable amount, the Governor of Mabama, in conjunction with the Commissioners of Agriculture of Alabam and Georgia, called the meeting of the Commissioners of Agriculture of the cotton States, to which was invited not only the farmers interested, but also fire bankers, merchants and others whose profits depend on costs but \$1. ative price for their goods. "The object aimed at was to get as far as possible a correct. estimate as to the amount of the grop. Each commissioner by correspondence or observation endeavored to get a true statement as to the average erop in each State. At the farmers' convention in Raleigh, August 29 to 31. the delegates from the different counties were asked to report on he respective counties as compared with the yield of last year. Reports were obtained from all but nine, and for these the reports from adjoining counties as to the increase or decrease were used. Allowing for 8 per cent increase in acreage, the amount of the erop for North Carolina was estimated at 60,000 bales. and at the Montgomery meeting all the reports were collected. The amount of the total crop was then estimated at 12,000,000.

"Three reports were received from different sources, one from the Commissioner of Agriculture, which made the amount 11,640,-000bales; one from the farmers union at their meeting in Oklahoma, 11,747,000, and another from such other sources as the delegates to the convention could furnish, 12,130,000.
