C., Nov. 23,-Will Thomas, a negro, accused of the assasination of Spurgeon Thomas, a white farmer, several weeks ago, was taken from a magistrate's constable by a party of masked men, chained to a tree and his body rid-dled with bullets. The lynching occurred about 14 miles from here, while the negro was being brought to the jail. WILL THOMPSON BE ELECTRO-CCUTED?

The Supreme Court has found No Error in His Trial and Unless the Governor Acts He Will Go to the Electrei Chair-Must Be Resentenced-Application for Life Sentence.

Last March, Judge Whidbee, holding the Superior Court of this county, sentenced to the electric chair a colored man named Sam Thompson, convicted of the charge of having killed his neighbor, Gus Alsobrooks, a f.w days before, while the latter slept in a tocking chair before his own fire. The ase was appealed to the Supreme Court, which stayed the sentence. The court has just handed down the decision that there was no error in the trial of the case, and so no new trial can be had. It will devolve upon the next term of court here in January to set the date of his electrocution. He is now in juli here and continues to declare his innocence of the charge against him

Thompson's lawyers, Messrs Red-wine and Sikes, will make an effort to get the Governor to commute the sentence to life imprisonment, on the ground that the evidence was circumstantial and was not sufficient clearness to be bryond question. The afforneys for the prosecution Messrs Williams, Love and McNeewill not oppose the petition and Solicitor Stack has not indicat-ed what his position will be.

One night last February while Gus Alsobrooks was sitting in his house on a farm some distance north of Monroe, some one shot his head off with a shot gun through the window near which he was sit-A small son of Gus', who was standing by his chair, was shot in the side, but has since re-covered. Thompson, who was a neighbor was suspicioned and was arrested. About a week before someone had shot at Gus on the roadside and Thompson's boy. Earnest, had been charged with this deed and arrested. His trial was to have come up the Monday was to have come up following the Saturday night on The which Gus was murdered. The theory of the prosecution was that Thompson shot Alsobrooks to death to prevent his testifying against his son in the Recorder's court.

White and Black Battle in South Carolina.

Lexington, S. C., Nov. 23,-The little town of Peak in the Dutch Fork was the scene of a bloody battle last night about 7:30 o'clock. when an effort was made by a number of citizens to arrest two negroes who, it was thought, held up P. Ellisor, an aged and highly respected farmer on the public highway a few miles from Prosperity, in Newberry county, yesterday afternoon.
As a result of the battle one ne-

gro is dead and two white men are suffering from pistel shot wounds received when the negroes opened fire on their would-be-captors. The second negro is probably floating in the waters of Broad river, as he was traced along a ditch after the signs of the trail was lost by he firing to the river's bank, where all trace was lost by the hounds that were placed on his track soon after B.
