## FAMOUS FEUD ENDS

Trapper's Son, Who Fought for Land, Gives Up.

Old Man Battled Rockefeller for Twenty-Two Years to Retain Cabin and Grounds Near the Adirondack Preserves.

Malone, N. Y.—Word has been received here that the celebrated Rockefeller-Lamora feud has been ended by the action of William Lamora in selling the cabin and grounds left him by his father, a hunter and trapper, who refused to sell his property to make up a section of William Rockefeller's vast Adirondack game preserve.

It was in 1882 that William Rockefeller set out to acquire the game preserve. He bought 59,000 acres around the town of Brandon, but could not obtain Oliver Lamora's cabin and clearing, which stood in the way. Out

of this arose a legal battle between the oil magnate's agents and the old trapper. It was expensive work for Lamora, but the old trapper's friends and neighbors sympathized with him and came to his aid financially.

Lamora was arrested for trespassing, having ignored the 3,000 signs posted on the preserve. But twice he defeated the Rockefeller agents in the courts by showing that the fish in the Rockefeller streams were supplied by the state hatchery, and that the state law forbids the setting aside of such waters as part of any private estate.

On the third occasion, when the agents got Lamora into court, it was a civil suit for damages. It went through several tribunals, finally reaching the court of appeals, which found in Rockefeller's favor. The damages awarded were only eighteen cents, but \$800 in costs was assessed against the old trapper.

This was a staggering blow and the loss of the cabin was threatened for a time. Lamora's friends, however, proved loyal, and clubbed together and raised the sum.

For the rest of the old man's life the Rockefeller agents recognized as useless any attempt to get him to sell. After he died, his son, to whom the property fell, assumed the same attitude as his father for a time, but he finally has been induced to sell.

### GALLANTRY MAY PROVE FATAL

Woman's Suffrage Movement in France Suffers From Attitude of Dandies and Mashers.

Paris.—Gallantry may prove fatal to the woman suffrage movement in France. The first suffrage parade took place here, but ended in failure owing to the attentions addressed to the women by a crowd of dandies and mashers, both old and young. Breaking through the lines, the men overwhelmed the women marchers with their attentions, smirking and bowing and raising their hats. Finally the leaders appealed to the police, and the streets were cleared of the mashers. Then there was no one else left to view the parade, and the women were escorted to their hall, where they made speeches to one another.

### WINS BIG LUMBER HOLDINGS

Edward Hines of Chicago is Victor in Famous Fight With State of Mississippi.

Jackson, Miss.—Edward Hines, Chicago lumberman, has won his famous fight with the state of Mississippi, involving timber holdings in the southern counties, valued at about fifteen million dollars. The supreme court held that a foreign corporation is not amenable to the statute prohibiting timber holdings by any corporation in excess of \$2,000,000 in value. The decision upholds the constitutionality of the statute, but rules that it can be made applicable to domestic corporations only.

Fat Men Not Good Risk.  
French Lick, Ind.—Fat men over forty are not good risks, according to Dr. William J. Mayo of Rochester, Minn., in an address to the medical section of the American Life convention. Thin young men are not desirable life insurance subjects, according to Dr. H. A. Baker of Pittsburgh.
