

NOTICE BY COUNTY BOARD OF ELECTIONS

Notice is hereby given that at its meeting in Monroe, N. C. on the 27th day of April, 1916, the County Board of Elections of Union county established the following new voting precincts, and established the polling places named therein, namely:

Unionville precinct, in Goose Creek township, beginning at a point in the western line of New Salem township at a point north of and including Jaa. C. Baucom's, and runs thence, crossing the Morgan Hill road between M. C. Haigler and H. M. Baucom, the Love Mill road north of the former residence of J. C. Williams, and the Sikes Mill road north of Atlas Rushing's, all in a northwesterly direction, to a point on the Concord road just north of and including the tenant house on the place of W. G. Long; thence in a southwesterly direction to the bridge on the Lawyers road over South Crooked Creek, near the Ely Belk place, so as to include the residence of John Belk; thence in a westerly direction, with the Lawyers road, the middle thereof being the line, to the ford on North Crooked Creek near the Jack Furr old place; thence in a westerly direction, up and with the various courses of North Crooked Creek to the Vance township line; thence with the Vance township line, in a southerly direction, to the point of intersection of the Monroe and Vance township lines; then in an easterly direction, with the dividing lines of Monroe and Goose Creek townships, to the New Salem township line; thence in a northerly direction, with the western line or edge of New Salem township, to the beginning.

Marvin precinct: In Sandy Ridge township, beginning in the northern line of Jackson township at its intersection with the present division line of West and East Sandy Ridge precincts, and runs in a northerly direction with this line to the New Town road at the Dr. Redwine place; thence, in a westerly direction, with the New Town road, the center thereof being the line, to the eastern line or edge of the Marvin school district; thence with the lines of the Marvin school district to the Mecklenburg county line; thence with the Mecklenburg county line to the State line; thence with the State line to the point where same intersects the northern line of Jackson township; thence with the northern line of Jackson township to the beginning. Polling place: Ezzell's Store at Marvin.

Change of Voting or Polling Places: North Goose Creek, to J. T. Helms old store. South Goose Creek, to Long's old store.

Registrars in these precincts will attend at the new polling places as required by law.

New Registration: In Unionville precinct and Marvin precinct. All voters living within boundaries of newly created precincts are hereby notified that they must register anew. Names will not be taken unless voter registers as prescribed by law.

This Board urges the advisability of every voter in the county making certain that he is registered. Failure to do so may result in inability to vote on the day of the primary.

Go get acquainted with your stove, with your old-fashioned range, familiarity with it will teach things new and strange; learn all the ways of your gas stove, oh brides of coming Junes, as gas stoves and a kitchen range can play entrancing tunes upon your husband's soul, till he'll rise from where he sat and pick his teeth and write a check for you to buy a hat. Another Peril; The Ritch Man in Politics.

Progressive Farmer. Another political peril is found in the use of money by candidates in primary elections and nominating conventions. Every State needs not only a stringent "corrupt practices act" providing against the lavish use of money by candidates, but also an aroused and righteous public sentiment requiring the enforcement of such a law. As one thoughtful man, speaking from experience, said to us recently: "We must have a law limiting the amount a candidate can spend or else the poor man will be out of it; and we must have a public sentiment compelling the observance of the law, or else the honest man will be out of it."

In other words even where a proper corrupt practice law exists, there will be cases in which a rich candidate will hire an army of heelers and will arrange to spend large sums of money; but through one subterfuge or another will fail to report the total amount spent, as required by law, thus making it appear that he has spent no more than the law permits, when in reality he has.

The rich man as an office-seeker, especially, if he fails to employ as managers men known to be clean as hound's teeth, is a peril we must be on guard against—a peril which has brought shame to more than one once proud commonwealth in recent years. Look out for the candidate whose boosters are men known to be out "for what there is in it for them." And while there's no reason at all why we should not elect a rich man to office if he stands for some high principle bigger than his pocket-book, the people must be continually on guard against the rich man who, having no fixed principle or policy, runs simply because he wants the glory of office and thinks he has money enough to get it.

Notes of Protest For French and British.

Identical notes renewing the protest of the United States against British treatment of neutral mails on the high seas have been handed to the British and French ambassadors at Washington.

The United States reiterates in more grievous terms its objection to the seizure and detention of legitimate mail matter bound to and from the United States, and insists, particularly, that Great Britain stop the practice of seizing vessels on the high seas and taking them into port to subject mail aboard to local regulations.

The note was given to the representatives of both France and Great Britain, because France formally concurred in the British memorandum in replying to the first American protest.

Over Two Hundred Civilians Murdered in Mexico.

San Antonio (Tex.) Dispatch, 26th. More than 200 civilians were murdered between Mexico City and Cuernavaca three weeks ago, according to private advices received here. Rebels operating between Cuernavaca and Mexico City attacked a train on which government employes were being sent to Cuernavaca to assume the governmental work in Cuernavaca. On the train were many women, wives and daughters of the employes. Almost all of them were reported to have been subjected to indignities after which a few of them were killed. The rebels attacked the train south of Tres Marias on a heavy grade, overwhelming the little guard and poured into the cars a heavy fire. Those who leaped from the doors and windows were shot down as they attempted to escape. Only one man—the express messenger—was left alive, according to the reports received here. The rebels obtained a consignment of ammunition said to be two million cartridges and three million pesos of the new issue of currency. Perfectly Calm. Angler (in deep water)—"Help! Help! Big Bandit Killed.

News of what officials regard as one of the most important accomplishments of the American expedition since it entered Mexico reached the War Department Friday from Gen. Pershing, who reported that Candelario Cervantes, a notorious bandit leader who participated in the Columbus raid, had been killed near Cruces by American troops. In his report Gen. Pershing said: "Cervantes was without doubt the most desperate and dangerous outlaw in Mexico except Villa himself. I believe his death will expedite capture of others, being second only to Villa and principal leader in the attack on Columbus. Cervantes was positively identified by papers found on person and by several natives."
