Stockholders of the Monroe Insurance and Investment Company will hold their annual meeting Thursday.

Mr. A. J. Porter and Miss Pearl Orr were married this morning at the home of the officiating magistrate, Esq. A. J. Porter of Vance township.

Mr. Henry Polk, who was badly injured in an automobile accident at Mineral Springs some weeks ago, has returned from a Charlotte hospital much improved.

Messrs. Bryan Coon, Dan Smith and Irl Griffith left Sunday for Flint, Mich., to drive three Buick cars to Monroe for the Secrest Motor Company. The distance is over a thousand miles.

Mr. J. Lee Polk of Mineral Springs has moved his stock of goods into the building across the street from his present stand. The new location gives him more room for the expansion of his business. Mr. Adam Tysinger accepted a position at Mr. Polk's garage.

The county board of supervisors will take both poll and personal property returns this year. Property must be listed for January this year instead of in May as in previous years. Esq. M. L. Floy, county supervisor, announces dates and places for listing of property in another part of this paper.

The Parents-Teacher Association will meet Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Chamber of Commerce. This association united in November with the N. C. Federation, Mrs. Rose Puffer and Mrs. Walter Crowell attending the State convention. It is now a live organization and has many plans whereby the city schools may be made more efficient. All parents are urged to attend this meeting.

Jasper Taylor, an old time darkey, who owns a farm near Mr. W. D. Floy's place on the Wolf Pond road, says he learned the alphabet from reading Mr. Billy Wolfe's paper back in the nineties. He has visited New York, where he has two daughters and two sons, but says he has long concluded that the South is the place for him. He was born in 1847, and is therefore 73 years old.

The contract for the erection of an ice cream plant on Mr. J. W. Fowler's lot near the cotton platform has been let to Mr. Eugene Ashcraft by the Hawn Ice Cream Company. It is to be completed in sixty days. The old creamery building on Talleyrand avenue will not be used. Some of the machinery for the plant has already arrived, and Mr. Hawn is here to superintend the construction work. The plant will have a capacity of several thousand gallons of ice cream per week; 200 pints of milk per day for Monroe consumption; and a creamery butter capacity of 500 pounds a week. Eggs will also be handled by the company. Mr. D. B. Snyder is the president, and Mr. O. D. Hawn the secretary and treasurer.

Republican sentiment in this county, according to Messrs. Gilmer Joyce and Gus Haigler, two of the party leaders, has crystallized upon Major-General Leonard Wood for the presidency. For Governor of North Carolina the local Republicans, naturally, favor Mr. J. J. Parker. Neither Mr. Joyce or Mr. Haigler mentioned Judge Pritchard in connection with the nomination for president. It is believed in some parts of the state that Judge Pritchard will go into the Republican national convention as a "favorite son" in order that Republicans of North Carolina may prove some factor in deciding the nominee. After Pritchard is eliminated on the first or second ballot the Tar Heel delegation will then be able to cast its vote for the most likely winner.

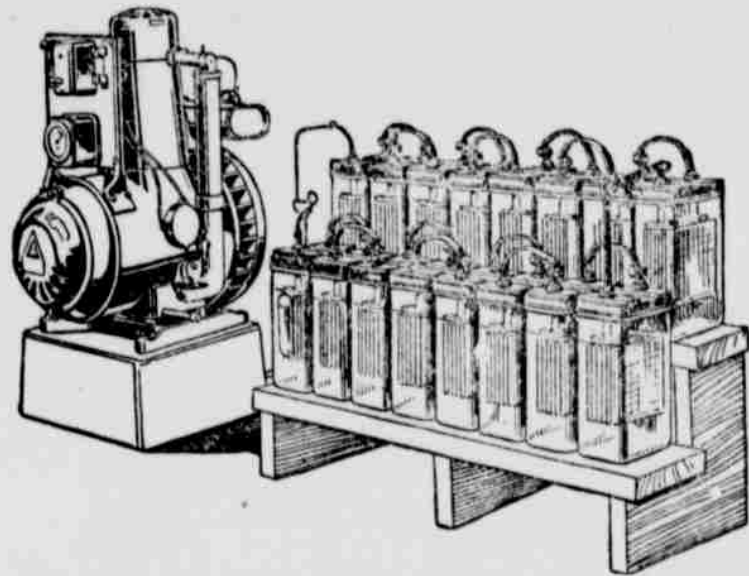
