LEE'S MILL ROAD TO BE GIVEN ASPHALT TREATMENT

Commissioners Find It Will be Cheaper to Repair old Macadam Roads in This Way.

The old macadam roads around Monroe will be treated with a low grade of asphalt, Mr. F. G. Henderson, chairman of the county road commission, stated to The Journal yesterday. Investigation, he said, convinced the commission that the macadam roads could be treated with asphalt much cheaper than they could be torn up and regraded. The asphalt will make a better road, too, he added.

The only roads to be asphalted are the Lee's mill road to the bridge on Richardson creek, the Jackson highway to Major W. C. Heath's home, and the Wolf Pond road for a short distance. The road leading through Benton Heights, and the one leading from the Iceman Knitting mill property will be treated with tar.

Mr. Parker was in Charlotte for the funeral of the late Judge Francis I. Osborne. He is well and favorably remembered here for his work in the famous police murder trial two months ago. He was chief assistant to Jake F. Newell, who prosecuted the policemen.
