

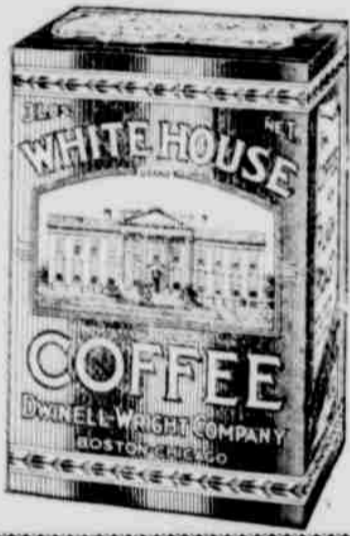

### How Nebraska Women Fare.

(From The Progressive Farmer.)

The United States Department of Agriculture made an extensive survey of three hundred and sixty farms in Nebraska. Women on three hundred and fifty of these farms reported on the number of hours they average a day. Questions were asked about the number of hours women work, their help, home conveniences, sanitary conditions, labor-saving devices, house equipment, etc.

Only thirty per cent of the farm homes have running water, and only seventeen per cent are lighted by gas or electricity. Sixty-five per cent of the farm women carry their water an average of fifty-five feet. Thirty-eight per cent have power machinery in some form, yet twenty-eight per cent are still doing the family washing with a board and tub and only twenty-one per cent have vacuum cleaners.

How do the above facts compare with conditions in your neighborhood? There are many reasons why numerous home conveniences should be added to our homes.
