

The Story Man of the Clan.

This George Whitley also had a son named George, a Bautist minis-ter. He was married twice and raised a large family. One of his daughters was bitten a rabid dog and died with hydrophobia. He also hud a son George who was my grandfather and my cousin Phillip's grandfather. He was one of the commissioners who established the boundaries of Stanly county and located the county seat. This George was born 1787, mar-ried Rebecca Cagle who was born in They lived on Big Bear Creek. 1791. had fifteen children, thirteen of whom lived to be grown men and women, among them was Addison. Whitley who was cousin Phillip's father. There was also a George in this family (the fourth) who was a very strong young man. One day he accepted a challenge from his companions to shoulder a three bushe bag of wheat while standing in a half bushel; he succeeded in shouldering the wheat, but it produced a rupture of some internal organ from which he

died. "The Whitley family in this section of North Carolina is a very large one, while many of them have gonto the western states. The Whitley's and those who have Whitley blood in them are and have been in the past an honest and progressive clasof citizens. Most of them have farmers, and have enjoyed a fair dearee of success. 
