Interesting Stories Concerning Things and Folks of Monroe and Union County

Union county farmers should hold their cotton for fifty cents. This is the opinion of Mr. A. L. Parker, a veteran farmer, who lives on Monroe, R. F. D. No. 7. "In my section," said Mr. Parker Saturday, "the army worms have done untold damage to grass, forage, and vegetables, but the cotton and corn crops haven't been injured much. I think this county will produce thirty thousand bales of cotton. The corn crop will be a bumper."

Something Else to Talk About.

"I have got an item for you," remarked Mr. Sam M. Parker, as he walked into The Journal office Saturday, "not for the news value it contains, but just to give my neighbors something else to talk about besides army worms and boll weevils." The writer hastily assured Mr. Parker that anything printable would be welcome. "Well," he continued, "I have a sheep that gave birth to two lambs on last New Year's day, and on Friday she gave birth to another pair. Now the point is, if worms and boll weevils are going to continue to trouble us, hadn't we better begin raising more sheep, cattle and hogs? I find that raising sheep is a profitable business."

No Disappointment in Store for Mr. Coon at Houston.

At every Confederate reunion Mr. Ben G. Coon, of Terrell, Texas, a native of this county, spends hours looking for some of his old comrades who fought with him during the war in Co. B, 15th N. C. regiment, or the "Monroe Light Infantry." One of his comrades, Esq. W. G. Long, of Goose Creek township, is determined that Mr. Coon will not have to look very long for the few remaining members of his old company at Houston, Texas, where the reunion will be held this year. Mr. Long wrote Mr. Coon last week telling him that he would be at Houston, and where he could be found. Mr. Long and Mr. Coon fought side by side during the war, and a friendship grew up between them in those dark days that has lasted all of these years. They were together at the battle of Lee's farm, Seven Days, South Mountain, Sharpsburg, Fredericksburg, and at the time of the surrender their regiment was among the crack "outfits" held around Richmond for the defense of the Confederate capital. Their commanding officer was Capt. Wm. MeRae, an engineer who was assisting in surveying the railroad through here when war was declared. T. R. Means of Mecklenburg county, L. A. Helms, and R. P. Jerome, both of this county, were their lieutenants, while the late James McLary was "top sergeant" of the company. So far as Esq. Long can ascertain, there are only eight surviving members of Co. B. They are: B. G. Coon, of Terrell, Texas; Tom A. Austin, of Monroe; D. B. Medlin, of Monroe township; John A. Helms, of Sandy Ridge; T. D. Wolfe, of Mineral Springs; C.

B. Sikes, of Charlotte; R. C. Forbis, of Mint Hill and W. G. Long.
