**Archie Fairley to Buy Cotton in Albemarle.**

We are sure that the readers of The News-Herald, and especially those of Albemarle and nearby territory, will read with interest the news that this town is to have another cotton buyer this fall. This additional cotton buyer is Mr. A. B. Fairley, of Monroe. Mr. Fairley is a son of the late Mr. J. M. Fairley of Monroe, who was well known by many Stanly people as cotton buyer, and young Mr. Fairley was brought up in the cotton business under his father. Mr. Fairley has not only had wide experience in buying cotton, but he has traveled throughout the country calling upon the large cotton mills with samples of cotton, and is therefore in close touch with the cotton buyers of America. He will work, it is said, in close touch with his brothers, who are cotton buyers at Monroe and Salisbury, and this will serve as a great advantage to him as well as Albemarle and Stanly county. Mr. Fairley has secured an office in the Trust Building to the rear of the Albemarle Real Estate and Insurance Co.

It is hoped that the coming of Mr. Fairley may be the means of putting the Albemarle cotton market up to that of the best markets of the

state. If this is the case it will mean much to this town and surrounding section. Albemarle extends to Mr. Fairley a most cordial welcome in our midst.

### Private Jessie Griffin.

The body of Private Jessie Griffin arrived from France last Saturday morning and was buried in the new Altan cemetery on Sunday. The funeral services were held in the Altan Presbyterian church by Rev. R. J. Mellwaine and Rev. E. S. Watson.

Private Griffin took influenza on board ship while on his way to Europe to serve his country during the world war and died soon after landing in France, near the close of the war. His body was buried in French soil along with many others who died of the dreaded disease. His grave was being well cared for in France by our government and the French people, but his parents wanted his body to rest where they could see his grave and where his tomb would continue to speak to neighbors and friends of sacrifice of devotion to duty, of obedience to parents, of love of home and loyalty to Jesus Christ as King and Savior, which virtue he exemplified in his life and in his death. A large concourse of neighbors, relatives and friends attended the funeral.—M.

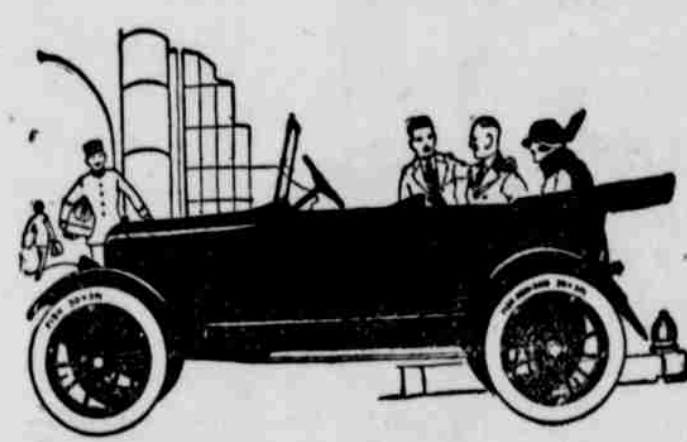
