A mail robbery in which more than \$300,000 worth of liberty bonds and twelve karats of unset diamonds were stolen between Atlanta and Charlotte on September 9 was disclosed Tuesday afternoon by postoffice inspectors following the arrest of Ivy W. West, 24, who was taken into custody at the home of his wife in Richmond, Va. West was one of three men that engineered the rob-bery, it is alleged. The other two alleged robbers were C. C. Monroe, and Rufus Knight, and both were arrested shortly after the crime and are now in jail in Atlanta. One secreted himself in the mail car of northbound Southern railway train from Atlanta and the theft of registered pouch was made before the train reached Charlotte. From Monroe and Knight the inspectors declared were recovered all but \$16,000 of the bonds and several of the diamonds.
