MINATURE FEUD RESULTS FROM KILLING OF A DOG

Two Well-Known Rowell Families of Vance Township Figure in Court Action. M. A. ROWELL SUING FOR \$500

A miniature feud between the two well-known families of Messrs. M. A. and John H. Rowell, of Vance township, has resulted over the killing of a dog—a feud that has already resulted in one cutting scrape, two trials in the Recorder's court, and the institution of a suit by Mr. H. A. Rowell to recover from Mr. John H. Rowell damages in the sum of \$500.

The story of the trouble between the two families' briefs told in the complaining of the plaintiff, and the answer of the defendant, which are on file in the Clerk of Court's office.

The plaintiff, Mr. H. A. Rowell, in stating the grounds for his civil action, alleges:

"That on the 28th day of August, 1920, the defendant, John H. Rowell, wrongfully and unlawfully assaulted, wounded, cut and injured the plaintiff with a deadly weapon, to-wit, a pocket knife; and did unlawfully and wrongfully cut the plaintiff on the back of his neck and stab him in the back of his left arm, cutting one of the muscles of his arm, and inflicting other painful wounds upon the plaintiff.

"That in assaulting, wounding, and cutting and injuring the plaintiff, as aforesaid, the defendant was actuated by malice.

"That as a result of said unlawful and criminal conduct of the defendant, the plaintiff was confined to his bed for several days and was unable to do any kind of work for about two weeks, and is still unable to use his arm to any extent, and his capacity for work has been greatly impaired; and plaintiff fears that he is permanently injured in his said arm. Plaintiff also suffered great mental and bodily pain, was forced to pay out a large doctor bill, and was otherwise damaged in the sum of \$500.

"Wherefore, plaintiff demands judgment: 1. For the recovery of \$500; 2. that the defendant be imprisoned until he pays same; 3. for the costs of this action; and 4. for general relief."

Dog Cause of Cutting. The defendant, in his answer to the complaint of the plaintiff, says: "It is admitted that on or about the 28th day of August, 1920, this defendant did inflict certain minor injuries on the neck and left arm of the plaintiff, but the defendant avers that he cut the plaintiff when he, the defendant, believed, and had reasonable grounds to believe, that the defendant was about to kill or inflict serious bodily harm on this defendant, and that the wounds which plaintiff received were inflicted by the defendant in his necessary protection and self-defense. Paragraph three and four of the complaint is untrue and denied."

Further answering the complaint of the plaintiff, the defendant says: "That on the 28th day of August the defendant had reason to believe that the plaintiff had killed his dog, and the defendant went to the plaintiff's house and asked him why he had killed his dog. The plaintiff thereupon replied that the defendant had killed his, the plaintiff's dog. The defendant denied having killed a dog of the plaintiff. The plaintiff became angry, and began cursing,

He asserted that he had not killed the defendant's dog. In reply, the defendant told the plaintiff he could show him the tracks that he had made. The plaintiff then went with the defendant to look at the said tracks."

While examining the tracks, the plaintiff, according to the defendant, used heated words. Then, as the defendant was returning home through the woods the plaintiff and his brother told the defendant to wait, that they wanted to see some more of the tracks, and ran and overtook the defendant. The defendant showed the plaintiff another track, and thereupon the plaintiff began to curse the defendant and the plaintiff's brother seized the defendant by his overalls and plaintiff drew his knife and tried to cut the defendant and did cut his clothes, and while plaintiff's brother was holding this defendant and plaintiff was cutting at the defendant with a knife, this defendant, acting on his reasonable belief that he was about to suffer death or serious bodily harm at the hands of the plaintiff, drew his knife and cut plaintiff in the neck and in the arms."

Hog Seizes and Runs Off with Negro Baby. A dispatch from Rich Square, N. C., states that news had reached there of a most distressing tragedy that occurred at the home of James E. Smith, of the Conway section, one of the most successful farmers of Northampton county, last Monday afternoon that unnerved Mrs. Smith, her daughter Mildred and all who witnessed it.

A negro woman, wife of a tenant on the farm, was picking cotton near the house, and had placed her six-months-old baby in a cotton basket filled with cotton which was only a few yards from her and before she knew what was taking place a hog that was in the field fattening on peanuts overturned the basket, seized the baby and was tearing its clothes from its body. The cries of the baby attracted its mother and her screams brought help. The hog ran off with the baby and had to be chased before the field and beaten with sticks before the baby could be taken from it. All its clothes were torn from its body and one foot so badly lacerated that it had to be amputated.
