MONROE HIGH TEAM WINS EIGHTH STRAIGHT GAME

Defeated Hand-Hitting Salisbury Team Friday, and Repeated on Wingate the Next Day

WILLIAMS MADE A HOME RUN

The hitherto invincible Monroe high school team won its seventh game from the hard-hitting Salisbury team here Friday in one of the best baseball clashes on the local diamond this season. Monroe started the ball rolling in the second frame, when Snyder hit for two bases; Seerest out short to first; Snyder going to third. English hits for a homer, Fairley pops up to catcher, pitcher goes wild and walks Laney, Lemmond and hits Wray. With bases full, two men down, Williams pops out to third. Clontz relieves Jackson in the box. Salisbury comes back strong in the fourth when Ruty walks, Holshouse hits fly to right, Laney errors, Ruffy goes to second, Ellis hits for double scoring Suggs. Next two up pops out to second, third out pitcher to first, Ellis left on second. Score remained three to two in favor of Salisbury until the eighth inning, when with two Monroe men out Snyder single steals second and third, Correll comes in as a pinch hitter and delivers the goods with a hit by third scoring Snyder, which tied the score. Monroe's ninth, English first man up, hits for a double, Fairley breaks up game with a double scoring English.
