Southern Judge Slays to Protect Wife



Col. Paul W. Beck, U. S. aviation corps, was a guest in the home of Judge Day, his friend for many years. Returning from driving other bridge party friends home, Judge Day says he found his wife struggling to free herself from the aviator's arms. To save his wife, Day struck Beck over the head with a revolver. The weapon exploded, killing Beck. Colonel Beck was prominent in army circles and in Washington society. Judge Day is a wealthy oil operator and former member of the Oklahoma supreme court.

Oklahoma City, April 10.—Jean P. Day, former Oklahoma supreme court judge, will never face a trial by jury.

This became evident in the wake of the coroner's jury verdict of execution, when both the army investigating board and County Attorney Forrest Hughes admitted that on the evidence now on hand there is not enough to convict in any Oklahoma court where the theory of the unwritten law condones any offense.

Even the army, through its board of inquiry from Fort Sill, publicly admitted that there is no ground upon which a murder charge can be laid against the slayer of Lieutenant Colonel Paul W. Beck, who was killed in the Day home last Tuesday morning when Judge Day suddenly returned to his home and found Colonel Beck and Mrs. Day in a compromising position.

The board, composed of Thomas G. Lanphier, major air service and successor to Colonel Beck as commandant at Post Field; V. L. Burge, captain air service, and Roger McCullough, captain air service, flew in from Fort Sill this morning and held a long conference with County Attorney Hughes. At the conclusion of the conference they issued the following statement:

"The board does not believe the version of the Days as to the conduct of Colonel Beck on the fatal morning was true. However, it does not believe that the testimony introduced at the inquest would justify the filing of a murder charge against Jean P. Day."

That the army does not intend to drop its investigation is an accepted fact here, however. One report is

that William J. Burns, head of the secret service of the United States will be asked by the war department, through the board of inquiry, for an independent investigation of all the facts.

A woman in Tulsa, a former servant of the Days, has, it is said, volunteered to give some information which may or may not have an official bearing on the case.

County Attorney Hughes admits that unless some further evidence develops he does not consider filing of a criminal complaint against Judge Day feasible.

"I do not think the evidence introduced at the inquest would justify my spending the state's money in filing any prosecution of a murder complaint against Judge Day," he said today.

"There is nothing I can see for me to do now, except abide by the recommendation of the coroner's jury."

At the Day home the coroner's jury verdict is accepted as final.

"We just want to forget all about it," was the Mrs. Day, but the situation, and Mrs. Day, pondering on nervous collapse after the strain of the inquest, was unable to see anyone.

Sentiment throughout the town seems to back up the stand taken by County Attorney Hughes.

A pathetic figure of the tragedy was Mrs. Rachael Beck, widow of the noted Indian fighter, and mother of the slain man. She occupied a drawing room on the train that arrived from Lawton shortly after noon—the same train that is bearing the remains of her son northward to Arlington cemetery, Washington.

Just before the train pulled out three airplanes from Post Field, came on the horizon, swept over the train and as the flag-draped casket that bore the body of Colonel Beck was put aboard, showered flowers, pink roses and carnations, down on the casket.

Three times the bird men circled over the train, each time dropping pink blossoms.

Mrs. Beck as they made each turn, stood beneath, her arms raised in greeting to the men who offered homage to her son. Then, as the train pulled out to the north, the three planes swung into formation and followed as escort of the air for the man who would never fly again. Lieutenant Beck, the son, was bitter at the verdict of the coroner's jury.
