An Ordinance Imposing and Defining the License and Privilege Taxes for the City of Monroe for the Fiscal Year Beginning June 1, 1922, and Ending May 31, 1923 and Each Fiscal Year Thereafter Until Amended.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Monroe do ordain:

That in order to provide for and raise funds for general municipal purposes, the following license taxes hereinafter specified are levied for the privilege of carrying on the business named within the corporate limits of the City of Monroe from the first day of June, 1922, to the 31st day of May, 1923, and for each fiscal year thereafter, and all such taxes shall be due and payable in advance at the office of the City Tax Collector of Monroe, N. C. The payment of any particular tax imposed shall not relieve the party paying same from liability for any other tax specifically imposed for any other business conducted by such person.

Section 1. Itinerants. For the purpose of this ordinance, any person, firm or corporation that does not list a poll or property for taxation in said city or is not a bona-fide resident of said City for a period of six months, shall be deemed an itinerant, and shall be subject to the taxes levied herein on itinerants.

Section 2. That all persons, before engaging in the business, trade, profession, occupation or calling or doing of any act on which a license tax is imposed by this ordinance, shall apply to the City Tax Collector for a license, and upon the payment of same as herein imposed, a license shall be issued to said applicant, provided said applicant is a fit and suitable person. Such license must be posted conspicuously in the place of business licensed, or, if such licensee has no regular place of business, the license must be kept at all times where it may be inspected by the proper city officials. No license shall be transferable or assignable except by consent of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Monroe, N. C.

Section 3. The adoption of this schedule of license taxes shall not abridge the right of the Board of Aldermen to change, alter, increase or decrease any of the license taxes herein levied at any time. And when any increase is made the license shall be revoked unless such increased tax be paid within thirty days.

Section 4. A separate license shall be required for each place of business unless places of business communicate directly with and open into each other.

Section 5. Any license issued under this ordinance shall be subject to revocation or suspension for a definite or indefinite time by the Board of Aldermen without refund of any part of the tax paid if the licensee or manager or person in charge of the business at the time shall have been convicted of crime, or if, in the judgment of the Board of Aldermen the business licensee does, by reason of its nature or the manner or the place in which it is conducted, constitute a nuisance or is a menace to public health, safety or morals. And upon the revocation or suspension of any such license, it shall be unlawful for the person to whom such license was granted to continue to conduct such business, and upon violation of this provision the offender shall, upon conviction, be fined \$50 or imprisoned for thirty days. Each day such business is conducted after such revocation or suspension of license shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. That every owner of a motor vehicle, private or for hire, or public dray or hack, used in transporting persons or property for hire shall apply to the City Tax Collector for license to operate such motor vehicle, public dray or hack, and shall obtain and display at all times on such vehicle a metallic sign to be furnished by the City of Monroe, N. C., without charge, upon payment of the license taxes hereinafter provided relating to such vehicle.

Section 7. That upon satisfactory proof that any such metallic sign or tag has been lost or destroyed, the Tax Collector shall furnish a duplicate upon the payment of a fee of fifty cents.

Section 8. That every person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance or carry on any business, trade, avocation or profession on which a license tax has been fixed, without having first paid the tax and received a license, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars, or be imprisoned for thirty days, for each offense, and each day said business shall be carried on shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 9. All license taxes imposed by this ordinance shall be due and payable in advance and if any person shall fail to pay any license tax required by the ordinance by August 15th, 1922, five per centum of the amount of such license shall be added to the tax required, and no license shall be granted until the license tax plus the five per centum thereof has been paid. The addition of the five per centum on the amount of said license tax shall not exempt the delinquent from the penalties herein prescribed in case of delinquency.

Section 10.—License Schedule

1. Body and top builders, and painters of automobiles, \$10.00.
2. Bank and trust companies, with capital stock and surplus of not over \$100,000.00, \$15.00. Over \$100,000.00, \$25.00.
3. Barber shops, for each chair, \$3.00.
4. Bicycles, each dealer or agent selling, renting or repairing bicycles, \$5.00.
5. Bill posters, advertising by use of bill boards, \$30.00.
6. Itinerant bill poster or sign tacker, per day, \$2.00.
7. Billiard, pool or bagatelle tables and shooting galleries, whether used or not, each table, or gallery, \$50.00.
8. Blacksmith or horse shoeing shops, \$2.50.
9. Bottlers of soda water, coca-cola, pepsi-cola, chero-cola, ginger-ale, rye-ola or other soft drinks, \$50.00.
10. Itinerant dealers selling or delivering to retailers bottled soft drinks or waters of any kind, \$50.00.
11. Butcher shops, retail dealers in fresh meats—provided this shall not apply to persons selling meat of their own raising, and provided further that persons who pay the taxes levied hereunder shall not be required to pay any additional taxes for the privilege of dealing in fish and oysters, \$35.00.
12. Circuses, menageries, wild west, dog and pony shows and every other show not specifically licensed herein, per day or part of day, composed of 15-car trains or less, per day \$50.00. More than 15-car trains per day, \$100.00. If more than 50 cents general admission is charged, such shows regardless of size, per day, \$150.00.
13. Traveling circuses, moving pictures, vaudeville, merry-go-rounds, ferris wheels, and other like amusement enterprises, per day, \$50.00. Provided this shall not apply to bona fide residents conducting moving pictures and vaudevilles in connection therewith, nor persons paying tax levied under section 23.
14. Upon each moving picture machine by bona fide residents of the City of Monroe, \$30.00.
15. Cleaning, dyeing, pressing and repairing clothes, \$15.00.
16. Coal or coke dealers, \$15.00.
17. Upon all ice plants or persons manufacturing and dealing in ice, either wholesale or retail, \$15.00.
18. Cotton buyers, brokers or factors, \$25.00.
19. Cotton gins, each plant, \$25.00.
20. Cotton seed dealers, \$25.00.
21. Harness makers or repairers, \$5.00.
22. Motor vehicles used in transporting property for hire, each, \$15.00.
23. Electrical contractors or persons engaged in wiring buildings, \$25.00.
24. Emigration labor agents or agencies for employment of persons to perform work or labor outside of Union county, \$200.00.
25. Exhibition, sleight of hand performances, rope dancing, not otherwise taxed or performed outside of a regular licensed theatre or moving picture show, per day, \$10.00.
26. Express companies, \$30.00.
27. Feather renovators, 25.00.
28. Fertilizer dealers or agents, \$15.00.
29. Fish and oyster dealers, provided that persons paying license tax under (11) are exempt from payment of this tax, \$15.00.
30. Pawn brokers, each, \$500.00.
31. Fortune tellers, mind readers, palmists, including Gypsy bands living in wagons, tents, or otherwise, provided the Mayor may in his discretion refuse to grant license, and no license shall be valid unless countersigned by him, \$250.00.
32. Repairing or storing motor vehicles, conducting a garage or buying and selling motor vehicles, new or used, of any kind, \$50.00. Provided that any persons conducting a repair shop for motor vehicles and not engaged in buying and selling same, \$25.00. Provided, further, this tax shall cover the tax levied under (41).
33. Any bona fide resident of the City of Monroe who shall conduct an amusement park or recreation ground within the City of Monroe shall be entitled, upon the payment of the license tax hereinafter provided, and on or in the grounds of same, as a part of such place of amusement, a swimming pond or ponds, boats, merry-go-rounds and ferris wheels, and bowling alleys, upon payment of a license tax of \$150.00.
34. Upon every retail dealer in gasoline, \$25.00.
35. Junk dealers, dealers in paper, rags or bones, \$25.00.
36. Ice cream peddlers who sell to consumers on the streets, \$10.00.
37. Ice cream and soft drink stands or fountains, \$10.00.
38. Itinerants or non-residents of the City of Monroe, selling lunches, lemonade, ice cream or soft drinks, balloons, flags, souvenirs, fruits, or other class of merchandise, per day, \$10.00.
39. Lunches or sandwiches, pies, or other things sold from wagons or vehicles on the streets, provided said vehicle will not occupy same space more than five minutes at a time, \$25.00.
40. Marble yard, dealers or agents in tomb stones or monuments, \$15.00.
41. Medicine vendors or peddlers selling or advertising medicines or drugs from alleys, vacant lots, or going from place to place, with or without free or paid attractions, per day, (provided they shall not occupy the streets without the written permission of the Mayor), \$25.00.
42. Merchants and dealers doing any kind of business at retail, not herein specifically taxed by this ordinance, \$10.00.
- 43a. Dealers in dry goods and notions, employing six or more clerks, \$25.00.
- 43b. Dealers in dry goods and millinery employing in the business of which the dealing in millinery is a part, six or more clerks, \$25.00.
- 43c. Dealers in boots and shoes employing, in the business of which the dealing in boots and shoes is a part, more than six clerks, \$25.00.
44. Dealers in men's furnishing employing in the business of which men's furnishing is a part, six or more clerks, \$25.00.
45. Upon all wholesale dealers in dry goods, groceries, hardware or any other merchandise, \$50.00.
46. Itinerant merchants or salesmen selling as proprietor or agent, goods, wares or merchandise, on

which no other tax is levied or imposed, per day, \$10.00.


47. Motorcycles, registration fee, \$1.00.
48. Motor vehicles, registration fee, \$1.00.
49. Motor vehicles, agents or dealers or traders in automobiles, new or used, or any person who buys automobiles for the purpose of sale or trading same, \$25.00.
50. Motor vehicles, dealers in accessories or parts, \$10.00.
51. Dealers in illuminating or lubricating oils, benzine or gasoline having an agency or warehouse for distribution thereof in the city, \$10.00.
52. Dealers in phonographs, gramophones, or talking machines, alone, \$15.00.
53. Piano or organ dealers, agents, \$20.00.
54. Building contractors, \$25.00.
55. Motor vehicles used in transporting persons for hire, each \$10.00.
56. Hacks or wagons or drays used for hire, each \$5.00.
57. Restaurants, cafes, or lunch counters, \$15.00.
58. Second hand clothing dealers, \$25.00.
59. Sewing machine dealers or agents, \$10.00.
60. Shoe makers who do a repair business, \$5.00.
61. Dealers in cigarettes, \$10.00.
62. Vehicle dealers, such as buggies, carriages, wagons or other vehicles not drawn by motive power, \$15.00.
63. Vulcanizers, retreaders or repairers of automobile tires, \$10.00.
64. Dealers in furniture, \$10.00.
65. Dealers in second hand furniture, \$25.00.
66. Real estate dealers, \$10.00.
67. Lightning rod agents, \$50.00.
68. Telegraph companies, \$10.00.
69. Upon all wood-yards, or persons selling wood at retail from a yard located within the city limits, \$10.00.
70. Upon all itinerant photographers, or persons carrying on the business of photography upon the streets of the City of Monroe, per day, \$10.00.
71. Plumbers or pipe-fixers and repairers, \$25.00.
72. Upon all dealers in sheet music and pianos, or piano players, \$25.00. Provided that this tax shall not be levied upon any person being taxed as a furniture dealer within the corporate limits.
73. Upon undertaking, \$20.00.
74. Tinsmiths, \$10.00.

Section 11. That the foregoing license granted to any person, firm or corporation shall be granted subject to all the ordinances now in existence or passed during the life time of said license that are applicable to the particular trade or profession for which said license is granted, and all ordinances heretofore passed by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Monroe, and not rescinded, are hereby declared applicable.

Section 12. That any person, firm or corporation obtaining license to carry on any of the business callings or professions herein enumerated and carrying on same in a manner unsatisfactory to the majority of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Monroe, may have his license cancelled and his right to conduct said business annulled, provided the unearned tax or proportionate part of said tax is returned.

Section 13. That it shall be lawful for any person, firm or corporation to engage in any of the businesses, trades, occupations or professions hereinbefore taxed without payment of license tax when the purpose of such person, firm, or corporation is to derive funds for charitable or religious purposes and written permission shall be granted by the mayor. Adopted this 10th day of June, 1922.
